Until a short time ago he had a contact with the city to gather baggage. He sold his team, and the police believe that he was preparing to migrate with the latest wife, but that he was arrested before the deal was completed. However, the police garalshaded the most of the proceeds of the sale.

TESLA'S FAKE FLASHES.

But He Won't Tell What He is Trying to Do. Wardellville, L. J., July 17.—Natives hereabouts are intensely interested in the nightly electrical display shown from the tower of the Wardellville Electric Co. Nicola Tesla is conducting his experiments in wireless telegraphy and telephony. All sorts of lightning were flashed from the tower and poles last night. For a time the air was filled with bright sparks of electricity which seemed to shoot out from the tower and poles in every direction. The display was continued until after midnight. The morning workmen about the plant declined to say anything. It is understood that Tesla has a well more than 200 feet high, situated beneath the tower and the tower's electrical waves are sent both underground and thru the air.
