

GRAIN PRICES FIRMER WITH A STEADY CLOSE

Liverpool Wheat Quoted Higher—
Modern Miller Bullish—Argentine
and Indian Shipments.

Liverpool wheat futures closed to-day
3d to 3d higher, and corn futures un-
changed.
At Chicago, July wheat closed 1/2c higher than
yesterday, July corn 1/2c higher, and
July oats 1/2c higher.
At Liverpool, white and colored wheats
are quoted at lower prices.
Cattle & Co. to J. G. Beatty: Official
statement of Indian affairs is not offering
any report officially, but from best in-
formation received Indians will have a little
left over. There is no doubt about
considerable damage.
Since Jan. 1 Argentine wheat shipments
have been 2,446,000 bushels, compared
with 10,014,000 bushels in the same period
last year.
Friday's Argentine wheat shipments, 3,
812,000 bushels, make 1,888,000 bushels.
Monday's Indian wheat shipments, 736,
000 bushels.
Argentine wheat from the interior are
favorable. Matze harvesting is being car-
ried on under generally favorable condi-
tions. Exportable surplus estimated at
2,000,000 tons.
Modern Miller reports: Weather con-
ditions for the past week have been more
favorable for winter wheat crop. General
rains have fallen through the territory de-
voted to raising that cereal, including the
Pacific coast, and in the southwest part of
the winter wheat belt more moisture was
needed. Improved prospects are reported
from nearly all sections, and some of the
cattle plant growth is not up to the average
for this season of the year. There are
complaints of frost in the early part of the
season in Southern Illinois.
Washington, March 25.—The final report
of the census bureau on cotton grinding,
showing the total amount of cotton ginned
in 1903, gives the following: Number of com-
mercial bales, including linters, 10,200,000;
against 11,275,000 for 1902. The crop, ex-
clusive of linters, in the United States,
was: 10,200,000 commercial bales, 1,052,000
square bales; 770,000 round bales; 75,000 sea
island bales.
