ONE OF LONDON'S PIONEERS.

Mr. W. A. Hodgman, whose death on Monday, has been referred to by The Advertiser, was born June 13, 1807, in Little York (now Toronto). He died at the residence of his son-in-law, with whom he lived during the last few years. He was sick but a few days, and passed away very peacefully. In him, no doubt, passed away the oldest pioneer of London and vicinity. He slept on the site of this city before there was a building on it. He lived in this city a few years, and also on lot 22, north half, con. 2, London township. He moved to Kilworth somewhere in the thirties, and embarked in business, building a tannery in connection with which he ran a shoe store. In those days it was nearly all custom work. He also ran a general store. Deceased was very fond of his gun and fishing-rod, and even of late years nothing pleased him more than to visit his old haunts with his rod. During the last season he often returned with a black bass or two, and at times with a good string. Years ago, when all this country was a dense forest, he killed many a deer, as well as many a wild turkey and goose. At the time of the building of the Great Western Railroad, when Komoka was to have the car shops, and everybody was buying lots there, he also bought, and moved there, in which place he resided for a few years after the boom. He then moved to Glencoe, and thence in a few years to Aurora,

Ill. He was married to Ann McGugan, in January, 1833, in London, Ont. While residing at Kilworth his wife died, in 1855, through heart failure. They had a large family, seven of whom are now living, to mourn his loss: Mrs. Earhart, in Haily, Idaho, and William, government land agent at the same place; Charles F., at Norfolk, Va.; Mrs. Oilphart, Wesley and Walter, in Chicago, Ill.; Mrs. Forbes, whose home he died. He had been a member of the Methodist Church ever since he was a young man.

She carried a bouquet of white carnations. The bridesmaid, Miss Estelle Wade, sister of the bride, was dressed in a handsome costume of myrtle green cloth, and carried a bouquet of red carnations. The groomsmen were Mr. Ed Munroe, Mr. Dowding played the "Wedding March." Only the intimate friends of both parties were present. The happy bridal party left by the afternoon train for London, where they will spend a week visiting their friends and relatives in the Forest City. Mr. Buxton is well and favorably known in Goderich and Petrolia, where he carried on his profession of photography. A host of friends wish him and his bride every good fortune this wedding day. The bride was the recipient of many valuable presents.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

An Address by Retiring Chairman Logan.

Mr. A. O. Jeffery Elected to the Free Library Board—Numerous Votes of Thanks—Final Meeting of the Board for 1898.

At the final meeting of the board of education for 1898, held last night, a lengthy address was delivered by the retiring chairman, Mr. Logan. Mr. A. O. Jeffery was elected to the free library board, and votes of thanks were freely indulged in. Members in attendance were: Mrs. Boomer, Messrs. Logan, McRobert, Bayly, Evans, McCormick, Dr. English, Boyle, Wilkins, Weldon, Dr. Teasdale, Gillean, Dr. Ziegler, Bridle, Hamilton and Macpherson, Secretary McElheran, Inspector Carson and Architect Matthews. Ex-Chairman D. W. Blackwell, Public School Principals J. H. Downing, E. E. Gibbs, G. B. Kirk, R. M. Graham, W. H. Liddicoat, W. D. Eickert, S. Baker, E. L. Eryant and F. Bryant and Mr. H. B. Leal were also present.

Mr. Bayly reported for No. 1 committee. Sixteen meetings were held during the year, and attended as follows: Mr. Bayly 10, Dr. Teasdale 12, Mr. Bridle 7, Mr. Strong 11, Mr. Boyle 13, Mr. Macpherson 11, Mr. McRobert 4, Mr. Regan 7, Mrs. Boomer 10, Chairman Logan 11.

Dr. English presented the report of No. 2 committee. During the year 24 meetings were held. Dr. English attended 21, Mr. McCormick 21, Mr. Hamilton 18, Mr. Evans 19, Dr. Ziegler 17, Mr. Weldon 15, Mr. Wilkins 20, Mr. Gillean 19, Mr. Martyn 5, and Mr. Logan 12.

Dr. Teasdale, for the audit committee, reported that accounts for \$990.31 had been passed for payment, and that the city treasurer had paid out over \$12,000. The appointment of a representative to the free library board to succeed Dr. J. B. Campbell, who was appointed to the board of education, was next dealt with.

Mr. McRobert named Mr. Walter Morgan. Dr. Teasdale seconded. Dr. English doubted if Dr. Campbell were willing to accept the appointment.

The secretary said no notice to that effect had been received.

Then Dr. English moved that Mr. Manigault be appointed. Mr. Bayly seconded. Mr. Gillean nominated Mr. A. O. Jeffery.

The first vote resulted in a tie between Messrs. Morgan and Manigault, and Mr. Jeffery dropped out.

On the second vote Mr. Manigault received the greatest number of votes.

Mr. McRobert moved to substitute the name of Mr. A. O. Jeffery for that of Mr. Manigault, and on a division of 10 to 6 Mr. Jeffery was elected.

The chairman's address was as follows:

"To the Members of the Board of Education: 'Gentlemen,—In completing my term as your chairman, permit me to thank you, one and all, for your uniform courtesy during the year. I can assure you that if mistakes were made (and to err

is human) they were of the head and not of the heart.

"The year just closed has been a busy and important one for the board, and as I pointed out in my opening remarks last February, the admission of London West into the city placed upon our shoulders new obligations and increased expenditure. An additional room was opened in connection with the public school there, a kindergarten room was established at Albert Hall, the salaries of the teachers readjusted, and all accomplished, I believe, not only to the satisfaction of this board, but to the satisfaction of the teachers, ratepayers and all concerned."

"The erection of the two-room school on Richmond street north will fill a long-felt want, and when it is opened I have no doubt but that a very large number of little children who have been unable to attend school in the past will avail themselves of the opportunity offered."

"Probably the most important transaction of the year was the erection and completion of what is known as the commercial building, in connection with the Collegiate Institute. By its establishment, accommodation has been furnished for all those pupils who, after passing the entrance examination, are desirous of taking up a course of study to prepare them for commercial pursuits. At present three rooms only are utilized, but so soon as an extra necessary, no doubt the board will have the fourth one opened. The building has been pronounced by competent judges to be about perfect in the matter of accommodation, and when I state to the board that it has been finished without what is known as an extra, all will agree, I am sure, that it reflects great credit on the ability of our architect, Mr. Herbert Matthews."

"At the inauguration meeting of the board I requested that provision be made for the paying off of the mortgage on the Queen's avenue property. This was done, and by the sale of debentures money was provided for this purpose, and the property is now free of incumbrance."

"The expenditure this year has slightly overrun the estimate as finally passed by the board. This is easily accounted for, when it is pointed out that after the committees had carefully prepared what they considered a very low estimate, \$1,500 was taken off so as to meet the views of the finance committee of the city council. Economy, I believe, has been the watchword of every member of the board, and as a result the over-draft will only amount to, for the Collegiate Institute, \$1,307.90, and for the public schools, \$487.83. The seating of the new building will account for a considerable portion of the Collegiate Institute overdraft."

"Considerable time during the year has been wasted in the discussion of 'domestic science,' but as the promoter of this new idea has stated that the object is to get the girls of from 14 to 18 years interested in the subject, and as the average age of the girls passing from the public schools to the Collegiate Institute is from 13½ years, there is therefore no place for it in the public schools."

"The again, I do not think it would be in the interest of the public schools to introduce the teaching of domestic science at the expense of any of the subjects now on the curriculum, as has been suggested by the minister of education. If he, as the head of the educational department of this province, thinks it desirable that domestic science should be taught in any branch of our public schools, then he should introduce the same. This would not place the responsibility on the shoulders of the trustees, who have now quite enough to answer for to the ratepayers."

"Personally, I know of no demand being made for such a subject in connection with the schools of Ontario, and the result of the late contest in this witty world for a considerable portion of the Collegiate Institute overdraft."

"There is, however, one branch of education which has not received its proper share of attention from the citizens of London. I refer to technical education for the boys. This city has become quite a manufacturing center, and the necessity for the education referred to is becoming more and more apparent. Of course the board of education cannot establish a technical

school; but surely there are public-spirited citizens enough in London who will come forward with sufficient funds to make a beginning in this laudable work, and I am sure it will not be considered out of place for me to suggest that the board of 1899 take some steps to interest citizens in some scheme to meet the demand. I have no matured ideas on the subject, but from conversation with gentlemen who have given considerable thought to it, I am thoroughly convinced of the necessity that exists for such a school in our city."

"While not desirous of referring to anything which would recall sorrowful thoughts, I may be permitted to refer to the great loss the teaching staff of London sustained in the death of the late Mr. A. C. Stewart, principal of Talbot street school."

"I desire also to express my sympathy with members of the staff who have during the year been for a time incapacitated for work. I refer particularly to Mr. Thomas Woodburn, principal of Park street school, and Miss McArthur, principal of Wortley road school. The former, I am pleased to say, has been able to resume his labors, and I trust that it will not be long before the latter is enabled to do so."

"In conclusion, I want to thank the trustees for their indulgence, co-operation and assistance during the year, and the officers and officials for their active and efficient work, and to express my appreciation of the noble work which has been accomplished by the staff of both the Collegiate Institute and public schools. Yours truly, 'J. M. LOGAN, Chairman.'"

The address was received by the members with hearty applause, and the singing of "He's a Jolly Good Fellow."

On motion of Mr. McRobert, Mr. Macpherson took the chair, and Mr. Gillean moved a vote of thanks to the retiring chairman. Mr. Logan, he said, had filled the office in a very satisfactory manner, and he was pleased that Mr. Logan would still be on the board.

Mr. Bridle seconded the motion, and other members added words of praise for the chairman. The motion was passed by a unanimous standing vote.

Mr. McRobert expressed regret at the retirement of Messrs. Martyn, Stewart and Bridle, and moved a vote of thanks to them, which was also unanimously passed by a standing vote. It would be many a day, said Mr. McRobert, before the board could fill the place vacated by Mr. Martyn, who was a particularly valuable man on No. 2 committee. Mr. Bridle replied.

Dr. English highly commended Secretary McElheran for his efficiency and courtesy, and moved, seconded by Mr. Bayly, that a vote of thanks be passed to him.

Mr. McElheran made a suitable reply. A vote of thanks to Sergeant-Arms Merritt, on motion of Mr. Gillean, was then given.

Speeches by several of the public school principals present followed.
