Toronto, Jan. 10—11 p.m.—The high area mentioned last night is passing north of the lake region, and the weather is turning colder in Ontario and Quebec. There is a pronounced low area moving southeast across the Northwest Territories and there are indications of the formation of another over the Southwest States. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Kamloops, 2-16; Calgary, 6 below-30; Edmonton, zero-34; Qu'Appelle, 16 below-6; Winnipeg, 28 below-2 below; Port Arthur, 10 below-2; Parry Sound, 18-30; Toronto, 22-40; Ottawa, 4-30; Montreal, 10-28; Quebec, 4-30; Chatham, zero-22; Halifax, 16-34.

Probabilities: Toronto, Jan. 11—1 a.m. Lower lakes. Strong easterly winds, cloudy and cold, with a light snow-fall at most places.

THEIR NEW ORGAN.

Dundas Center Church to Have a Noteworthy Celebration Next Tuesday Night.

On Tuesday evening next the large three-manual Kuhn-Warren electric organ that is being built for Dundas Center Church will be opened by Mr. William C. Carl, the celebrated organist of the First Presbyterian Church of New York City. The organ, which will be one of the finest in Canada, is built entirely on the electric system, there being no communication between the keyboard and the organ proper but electric cables. It contains three manuals (great organ, swell organ and choir organ), a large pedal organ, 37 speaking stops, 15 couplers, electric combination pistons, crescendo pedal, stop switch, etc., and many other contrivances made possible by the agency of electricity. Many who attended the recitals given upon the organ in the factory of the makers at Woodstock before it was shipped here, testify to the beauty and volume of tone and the wonderful effects the instrument is capable of producing. The case is of light oak, and the front pipes are chastely decorated with

DEATH OF ROBERT MORRIS.

Middlesex Pioneer Called Away at the Advanced Age of 83 Years and 10 Months.

After an illness of eight weeks, Mr. Robert Morris, of Hyde Park, the aged father of George F. Morris, of this city, died last evening about 8 o'clock. Mr. Morris had reached the advanced age of 83 years and 10 months, and had been a respected resident of Middlesex since the pioneer days. A native of Gloucestershire, England, he came to Canada in 1840, and settled upon a bush farm on the seventh concession of the township of Westminster, which he cleared, enduring all the hardships incident to pioneer settlement. After residing there for some time he sold the farm, and engaged in teaming goods from Hamilton to London, and from Port Stanley. Some time afterwards he located at Kilworth, where he constructed a ferryboat and carried the heavy timbers used in the construction of the Great Western Railway across the river, and thence to Komoka and other portions of the line between London and that place. Subsequently, when the boom struck Komoka, he removed to the city, and engaged in farming and butchering, continuing in that business until about eight years ago, when Mrs. Morris died. He then removed to Hyde Park, and had lived with his son Albert ever since. Mr. Morris was known to many old settlers in Westminster and London townships, and held in the highest esteem by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. He possessed a strong constitution, and up to a few weeks ago was in the enjoyment of good health. He leaves three sons—Albert, at home; John, of Lobo, and George F., of this city; and one daughter—Mrs. W. J. Guppy, of Windsor. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon.

THE MOTHER LODE.

Original of the Klondike Placers Discovered at Four Points.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 11.—W. J. Jones, of Port Townsend, Washington, who arrived from Alaska on the steamer City of Topeka yesterday, brings news of the discovery of what is supposed to be the mother lode and quartz original of the placers of the Klondike. The discovery was made within four miles at four different points, one of them at the Dome, a high mountain at the source of the Eldorado Creek by Ft. Slavin; the second at No. 31 Eldorado, by A. H. Jose and partners; the third one in Nugget Gulch at No. 36, and the fourth somewhere in the twenties on Bonanza Creek.

The trend of the vein is northwest by west, westerly from the Dome. It is found about 30 feet below the surface and under the muck and alluvial deposit. The lode is about 15 inches wide and makes a uniform width. It is generously sprinkled with free gold. Mr. Jones brings down samples of the ore, and every one who has seen them says the rock is precisely the same in character as is found in Southeastern Alaska.
