MUTINY AMONG RUSSIAN TROOPS ON ARCHANGEL FRONT EIGHT CARLOADS OF GASOLINE EXPLODE AT BAYONNE, N. J.

TEUTONIC PRISONERS BEING SHIPPED FROM CANADA TO THEIR HOMES IN EUROPE

Two Trainloads of Germans, Austrians and Bulgars Are At Quebec Awaiting Deportation On Steamer Sicilian—Soldiers With Fixed Bayonets Guard Cars.

Quebec, July 24.—Two trainloads of Teutonic prisoners, including Germans, Austrians and Bulgars, have arrived here and are awaiting deportation today by the C. P. O. S. Sicilian. The cars are guarded by sentries with fixed bayonets.

Four hundred of the prisoners are from Kapuskasing, Ont.

LIGHTNING CAUSES MORE FOREST FIRES IN WESTERN STATES

Hundreds of Acres of Valuable Timber Consumed by Flames.

THOUSANDS FIGHTING FIRE High Wind Overcomes Temporary Advantage Gained in Same Areas.

San Francisco, July 24.—Much of the Pacific northwest was under a pall of smoke from forest fires burning today in Montana, Idaho and Oregon. Lightning was responsible for a number of new fires reported, and high wind in the afternoon overcame the temporary advantage, brought about by the slight rainfall which accompanied the thunderstorms, for several days, had been threatened by fires on three sides. The most serious fire, to the north of St. Regis, covered an area of thirty miles in circumference.

MANDATED AREAS TO GET PREFERENCE IN TRADE WITH BRITAIN

Hon. Austen Chamberlain Carries Point in Debate On Finance Bill.

London, July 24.—Hon. Austen Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer, concluded the debate on the third reading of the finance bill, Wednesday. He moved its rejection, and the government initiated a system of colonial preference. J. J. Wilson also objected to the extension of a preference to mandated territories. Mr. Chamberlain, in reply, declared that it was not proposed that we take for ourselves in the mandated country an advantage which was not open to any other members of the league of nations, but in respect to the mandated territories, we would give them in our markets something we did not give to all the world.

BORDEN NOT LIKELY TO REACH OTTAWA UNTIL NEXT WEEK

VETERANS URGE GOVERNMENT TO AID PRODUCTION

Stimulus Should Be Given To All Branches, Not Agriculture Only.

FINANCES FOUND GOOD

Soldier's Time Overseas Should Count on Homesteading, Declare Members.

Montreal, July 24.—That a stimulus should be given not only to agriculture, but to the other food-producing possibilities of Canada, notably stock-raising and fishing, was the decision arrived at this morning at the session of the Army and Navy Veterans' Association convention. Discussion on this arose on a resolution of the Army and Navy Veterans' Halifax branch, which emphasized that too much stress was being laid by the Government on the question of supporting agriculture, while support to other vocations was denied. Ex-soldiers in vocations other than farming were in quite as much need of assistance as the tiller of the soil, according to the resolution, and it professed to be mitigated. It was essential that agriculture should not be neglected to the exclusion of every other form of food production.

Resolutions Passed.
A report was adopted by the convention warmly advocating the organization of ladies' auxiliaries for the association. Another resolution adopted recommending that the association should be represented on the civil service and registration commissions of the Dominion House.

MINERS ARE DETERMINED

Agreeable To Settlement, But Not On Government's Terms.
SAILORS MAN PUMPS.
London, July 24.—The pumping situation in the Yorkshire mines today was pronounced satisfactory, with the exception of one important mine. Two hundred sailors are now manning the mine pumps without interference. Sir Eric Geddes, minister without portfolio, who is on the spot representing the Government, has received satisfactory replies from the lord mayors of Leeds and other municipalities, whom he asked yesterday to see that the supply of coal was not interrupted. The supply of coal was not interrupted, and the outlook for householders is serious. All mines in the North Staffordshire district, which were idle yesterday because of the strike, resumed operations today.

GERMANY'S PREMIER WARNS HIS PEOPLE AGAINST TREVOLUTION

Declares Citizens Have Reasons For Unrest and Discontent.

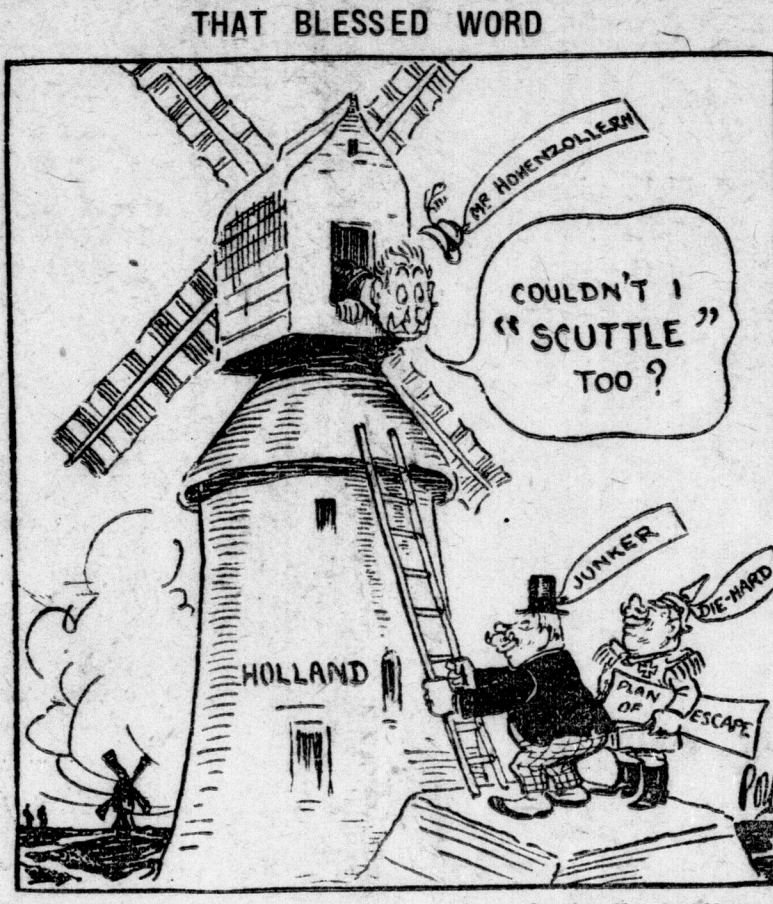
Weimar, July 24.—By the Associated Press.—In addressing the national assembly today, Gustav Adolf Bauer, the premier, alluding to the recent strikes, warned the country against a hasty revolution, which he said could only be a counter revolution resulting in disaster.

The premier agreed that the great masses of the people had ground for discontent, and said it was the Government's task to remove any just reason for this. The remedy, he added, was a law regulating workers' councils and economic councils, which the Government would draft.

U. S. Building Gigantic Liners To Cross Atlantic in Four Days

Washington, July 24.—Two gigantic ocean liners, larger than any ships now afloat, and designed to cross the Atlantic in four days, are to be built by the shipping board. They will be 1,000 feet long, and of 20 knots speed, and will be equipped for use as commerce destroyers in the event of war.

Announcement was made today by the board that plans for the ships had been completed, and that work on them would be started in the near future. It is proposed to provide a special terminal for them at Fort Pond Bay, Long Island.

VERA DE LAVELLE SENT DOWN FOR TWO MONTHS PROMISES NOT TO BREAK JAIL AGAIN

Woman Who Aided Frank McCullough Pleads Guilty On Two Charges—Sentences of Two Months Each To Run Concurrently.

Toronto, July 24.—Pleading guilty to escaping from custody, Vera De Lavelle was today sentenced to two months in the jail farm on that charge, and a similar sentence was imposed on her by Judge Coatsworth on the charge of aiding and abetting Frank McCullough to escape. The terms are to run concurrently. Thus the girl will spend only two months at the institution. She promised his honor that she would not try to escape.

PRESENCE OF TROOPS BOY BARES SCARS PUTS END TO RACE RIOTS IN CAPITAL

Only Isolated Outbreaks Reported in Washington During Night.

Washington, July 24.—Although there were reports of isolated outbreaks of rioting, including firing into a street car, last night passed without serious renewal of the race rioting which has terrorized the national capital since Saturday. The presence of 2,000 armed soldiers, and co-operation generally by the public, with the request of the city authorities that street traffic be held to a minimum, resulted in quieting the situation, and both the military and city authorities expressed the belief that there will be no more serious trouble.

2,000 TROOPS ARRIVE AT HALIFAX TODAY ON STEAMER REGINA

Transport Docked Shortly Before Noon With Large Party of Canadians.

Halifax, N. S., July 24.—The transport Regina, nine days out from Liverpool, with 2,000 returning Canadians, docked shortly before noon today. Among the 142 officers returning on the steamer was Lieut. Col. B. J. Montague, C. M. G., D. S. O., M. C., of Winnipeg, who acted as assistant quartermaster-general of the second division through the fighting in France, and was later appointed chief corps staff officer for demobilization in England.

80,000 GALLONS OF GASOLINE EXPLODE; FOUR ARE INJURED

Cause of Accident at Bayonne, N. J., Plant Not Yet Determined.

CONTAINED IN EIGHT CARS

Entire Plant For Some Time Appeared To Be Doomed To Destruction.

Bayonne, N. J., July 24.—Eighty thousand gallons of gasoline, contained in eight tank cars, exploded on the switching track of the Texas Oil Company here this morning, causing a fire which resulted in the serious injury of four persons, with many others suffering minor burns. The property loss to the company was heavy. The cause of the first explosion has not been determined. The first car exploded about 7 o'clock, and the flames enveloped the other cars before they could be removed from the danger zone.

BRITISH WARSHIPS NEEDED IN BALTIC TO PREVENT RAIDS

First Lord of Admiralty Explains Why Ships Are Kept There.

London, July 24.—In the House of Commons yesterday, Right Hon. Walter Hume Long, first lord of the admiralty, stated that British warships were kept in the Baltic in order to prevent unprovoked attacks on the coast towns of the Baltic states and Finland. Interference with the feeding of the population, and the spread of Bolshevism, he said, were the reasons.

DETROIT PASSES THE 1,000,000 MARK

Directory Officials Claim a Steady Increase in the City of the Straits.

Detroit, July 24.—Detroit is well past the million mark in population, according to the records of E. L. Folk & Co., publishers of the Detroit directory, the 1919 edition of which will be issued some time in September. Directory officials, however, said the exact figures were not yet available, but that the work of compilation has so far progressed that their estimate is warranted.

YELLOW FEVER SCARE BARS PERU VESSELS

Guayaquil, Ecuador, July 23.—Because of reports of yellow fever prevalent in Northern Peru, the Ecuadorian board of health has closed all the ports of Ecuador to vessels arriving from Northern Peruvian ports. A dispatch from Guayaquil, July 21, reported an outbreak of yellow fever in the province of Piura, Northern Peru.

Bolshevik Representative in Australia Liberated by Government Order.

RUSSIAN TROOPS ON ARCHANGEL FRONT MUTINY, SURRENDER TOWN AND JOIN FORCES OF BOLSHIEVIKI

British Government Receives Dispatch From Major-General Ironsides, Who Declares He Has Situation Well in Hand and Believes Fresh British Volunteers Will Bring About Order.

London, July 24.—The Government has received a dispatch from Major-General William E. Ironsides, commander-in-chief on the Archangel front, stating that the Russian troops have mutinied and joined the Bolsheviks, handing over the town of Omega and the Omega front to the enemy. The latter also tried to take the railroad front, but were repulsed.

There are few British troops on the railroad front, and none on the Omega front. Gen. Ironsides now has the situation in hand, and believes that the fresh British volunteer troop "are equal to their difficult and perilous task."

THIEVING SHOWS INCREASE SINCE PEACE IN BRITAIN

London, July 22.—Thieving has increased immeasurably throughout England since the end of hostilities. The police have taken on many novel forms. Recently, two large oil paintings were stolen from the wall of a country house in Devonshire. A Kent village. Woman's Gown Was Cut a Trifle Too Far South; Gets Damages

Detroit Maiden Objected to Dress Resembling a Bathing Suit.

Detroit, July 24.—There is reason in all things, and a limit, even in the brevity of a gown at the neck. So thought Miss Lulu Bennett, who was in Justice Theodore J. Richter's court yesterday to appear against Louis Stoll, a tailor at 360 Hastings street.

When Lulu received her gown from Stoll and had tried it on she decided that it extended too far south. She took it back and asked that Louis alter it to the extent at least of a quarter of an inch more dress extending in a northerly direction.

EVANGELIST CHARGED WITH ACTING WITHOUT LEGAL AUTHORITY

Claimed to Have Performed Marriage Ceremony Near Cornwall.

Cornwall, July 24.—Evangelist L. Dornier, who has been serving in Millersburg for some months past, representing a religion known as the "New Church," appeared before Judge O'Reilly today on a charge of performing a marriage ceremony without having legal authority to do so. Sufficient evidence was submitted to show that he had performed a marriage ceremony between a young couple residing in the vicinity of Millersburg on January 21 last, and the case was adjourned until September 2 for the submission of further evidence. Draffin being allowed his liberty on his own recognizance of \$1,000. Judge O'Reilly instructed the evangelist that he was to refrain from performing marriage ceremonies in the meantime.

RELATIONS RESUMED BETWEEN RUMANIA AND THE UKRAINE

Berlin, July 24.—Diplomatic relations have been resumed between Rumania and the Ukraine, the Ukrainian bureau announced today.
