CLAIM BANK ACCOUNT OF DUKE ST. SUICIDE D.C. McDonald Left Several Thousand Dollars and Several Heirs Are After the Money.

It would appear that there will be some struggle for the body and property of Donald Cameron McDonald, who committed suicide in Duke-street last week. J. E. Leslie of the Willard House, Teraplay-street, has been very busy for the last few days endeavoring to get the permission, having notified the body, while the body, having notified the body, Charles Abbott, 1177 Cordova-street, Vancouver, niece of the dead man, she has asked that the body be buried in St. James' Cemetery, beside that of his sister, Mrs. Mary Baker. Another man, living on Lake Huron, has also telegraphed that he believes that McDonald was his cousin, and that he will come to the city to identify the body.
