COUNTY COUNCIL BOOSTS SALARIES OF OFFICIALS

Treasurer and Road Superintendent the Lucky Ones—Board of Works Proceedings.

HAMILTON, Dec. 7.—(Special.)—The county council this afternoon increased the salary of Treasurer Cochrane from \$1800 to \$1900 and Road Supt. Taylor \$1100 to \$1200.

The boards of works will install 52 street lamps in the new annex. The city engineer was instructed to consult the engineers of the hydro-electric commission as to the route of the Dundas-Hamilton pole line thru the city.

The big blow on King-street, near Main, will be filled with garbage. The board will offer to pay 40 per cent. of the cost of a curb around the Gore Park if the parks board will pay the remainder.

The Coadjutor Bishop of Toronto, who claims to be supplying power to the city quarry under the agreement rushed thru the council last year, and which has demanded pay for the two transformers, will be told the city does not recognize the agreement.

Prof. D. C. Hogarth, Oxford University, lectured this evening to the Archaeological Institute on Hittite Discoveries in Relation to Early Greek History.

Rev. Dr. Tovell, Central Methodist Church, has accepted an invitation to become associated with Rev. Dr. Cleaver in the pastorate of the Trinity Methodist Church, Toronto.

COMMITTEE OF FIFTY ON CONVENTION PLANS

Conservatives Will, Early in New Year, Begin Preparations for a General Getting-Together.

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—(Special.)—The report of the special committee appointed by R. L. Borden at the request of the caucus for the purpose of taking into consideration matters connected with the approaching convention of the Liberal Conservative party, recommends:

(1) That a committee of fifty, of whom not more than twenty shall be members of parliament, be known as the committee on preliminary arrangements for the Dominion convention of the Liberal Conservative party, be appointed by its leader.

(2) That the said committee be called together in Ottawa, for their first meeting, on some day in the month of January, 1910, to decide on the best way of getting the whole party through the Dominion to join heartily in the said convention, and to arrange the system of obtaining delegates for the convention, and all other matters connected with the same.

(3) That while it is the opinion of this committee that the Dominion convention should be held in the City of Winnipeg two or three days previous to the Winnipeg exhibition, which will be early in July, the final decision as to the place of holding the said convention should be left until the first meeting of the committee on preliminary arrangements, and that in the meantime our leader be asked to communicate with the Conservative provincial prime ministers, and the Conservative leaders of the opposition in the provinces which have a Liberal government, and also with the provincial Conservative Association executives in those provinces where such exist, and request their opinion as to the best time and place for holding the convention, in order that their views may be laid before the committee on preliminary arrangements at its meeting in January.

(4) Your committee further recommends that each member of parliament and the defeated Conservative candidates be requested to consult the executive of the association for his electoral division, with the object of obtaining their views and that the whips of the respective provinces be requested to transmit immediately to each defeated Conservative candidate a copy of the recommendations, when concurred in by caucus, and invite an expression of their views and the opinions of the said riding executive thereon to be laid before the committee on preliminary arrangements at its meeting in January.

The above report was unanimously concurred in and adopted by the Conservative caucus to-day.

Whitewear Industries of Toronto Employ Thousands

Great Advances Made in Range of Designs—Where Labor Comes From—History of the Business in Toronto—Three Million Dollars Invested.

Forty Thousand Per Week Paid in Wages

So anxious are the manufacturers to secure more help that they are now considering the matter of bringing out several thousand from the old country. An estimate, compiled by the Employers' Association, fixed the number of vacancies in Toronto for girls at the present time at about 3000.

Just why a dearth of operators should exist in a city full of working girls is a question not easy of solution, especially when it is remembered that the wages paid operatives average much higher than in many other lines of work. It seems a reasonable conclusion, however, that a little more publicity regarding the conditions under which operatives are employed in the factories would go a long way towards relieving the situation.

All girls, whether rich or poor, seem blessed with a greater or less degree of the aesthetic temperament, and the name "factory," with its old-fashioned, body-wrecking connotation, is almost unappreciated on the sensibilities.

Song of the Shirtwaist. If a second Thomas Hood should attempt to add to the seamstress' literature by writing a "song of the shirtwaist," with a modern whitewear factory as the setting, it would be his duty to do so.

Toronto whitewear factories are a credit to the city and a comfort, so far as work can be made comfortable, to the people engaged in the trade. They are well lighted, very spacious and well aired. When on his trip thru the Allen and Gale factories yesterday the World man was surprised to find the atmosphere in the buildings practically as pure as that outside.

Accommodation for Employees. In the basement of some of the buildings the company has provided a locker for each employee, where she may hang her hat and wraps, and has also allotted space for a lunch room, as most of the girls take their lunch with them.
