Nichol, Vocational Officer for Ontario, No. 116 College Street, Toronto, when full particulars will be gladly furnished and arrangements at once made for a board to enable those entitled to obtain courses of instruction in the subjects suitable to their particular disability.

In addition to getting instruction free, the support of the soldier and his family or dependents during the period of retraining, and for one month after it is completed, is provided for, according to scale.
