Clementina had its origin in ancient Rome. Clemens was a cognomen, and was borne by Vespasian's nephew. Titus Fiavius Clemens, who was put to death by Domitian on a charge of atheism, like others who went over to Christianity. A very early church at Rome is dedicated to him, and he is thought by some to be the same Clemens which St. Paul mentions.

Clemens, taken as a Latin adjective, signifies "merciful"; from it the substantive Clementia, came to be formed. The Romans worshipped Clementia, the personified virtue, as a goddess, bearing a cup in one hand and a lance in the others, and the title, "Your Clemency." became the mode of addressing the control of the con Major W.
