WOMAN ROCKED HER DEAD BABY

Refused to Believe That Life Had Ebb'd—Father Said to Have Refused to Call Doctor.

HAMILTON, April 12.—Coroner Hopkins found a pathetic case today when, on the advice of neighbors, he

went to the house of Mrs. George Campbell, King William street, and found the mother crouching over her infant, which had been dead some time.

She refused to believe it when the doctor gently broke the news to her, but continued to rock and sob her grief. The authorities have ordered an inquest. It is alleged the father was told to get a doctor, but did not do so.
