WOMAN ROCKED HER DEAD BABY

Refused to Believe That Life Had Ebb'd—Father Said to Have Refused to Call Doctor.

HAMILTON, April 12.—Coroner Hopkins found a pathetic case today when, on the advice of neighbors, he

went to the house of Mrs. George Camp, King William street, and found the mother crooning over her infant, which had been dead some time.

She refused to believe it when the doctor gently broke the news to her, but continued to rock and sob her grief. The authorities have ordered an inquest. It is alleged the father was told to get a doctor, but did not do so.

Thirty-Inch Main Breaks and Another Service Pipe Springs Leaking—Citizens Are Suffering.

QUEBEC, April 12.—Owing to a break in the 30-inch water main near the Lorette Reservoir, the city has been without its water supply since yesterday morning, and, judging from reports, there is no possibility of the main being repaired until late tonight or tomorrow.

To aggravate the situation, the old 18-inch service pipe has sprung a leak. The citizens of Quebec are suffering every inconvenience and in case of fire the safety of property is at the mercy of the situation.

VANCOUVER EDITOR DEAD

VANCOUVER, B.C., April 12.—The death occurred here Friday of F. J. Deane, formerly of Nelson, some time owner and publisher of The Nelson News. He later became publisher of The Cranbrook Herald. He was a member of the legislature of British Columbia from 1898 to 1900 and prominent in Masonic circles, being a past master of the Grand Lodge of British Columbia.

MILITANT LEADER GIVEN HER RELEASE

Mrs. Pankhurst Served Only Nine Days of Three Years' Sentence, But Is Liable to Re-Arrest.

LONDON, April 12.—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the suffragette leader, was released from Holloway jail this morning after having been on a "hunger strike" since she was sentenced only nine days ago, to three years of penal servitude.

Mrs. Pankhurst was released on license under the terms of which she must report at frequent intervals to the police authorities, and in case she commits any misdemeanor she is liable to immediate arrest without a warrant and must then serve out her full term of conviction. It is understood that the intention of the authorities is to allow her to be free only for a limited period until she regains her strength.
