It may interest many members of the Rite to state that the oldest Mason of the Rite believed to be living in Canada, resides at Carleton in the city of St. John. Brother Joseph B. Whipple, a land surveyor, and a very excellent citizen, who was born in Yarmouth, N. S., on December, 29th, 1794, and who is still possessor of all his faculties, was made a Mason in Digby Lodge No. 6, on the Registry of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, held at Digby in July, 1816, and took the Master's Degree in the same Lodge on the 25th April, 1817. In June, 1817, whilst Brother Whipple was on a visit to the city of Norwich, Conn., the Degrees of Secret and Perfect Master were conferred upon him by the Ineffable Lodge at that place, and which was then attached to the Harmony Lodge. The Degrees were conferred at an emergency meeting called for the purpose. Our venerable brother has a very tair recollection, after the lapse of sixty-four years, of the spirit and work of the
