TIGHT SKIRTS TO SAVE GERMANY

Semi-Official Edict Puts Ban on Flowing Garments—Need the Cloth to Clothe The Soldiers

Berlin, Sept. 8.—Narrow skirts will be worn by the women of Germany until the war ends, if martial law succeeds in its attempt to dictate fashions.

The leading German dressmakers, in a patriotic desire to break away from the tyranny of Paris, went to the opposite extreme and decreed very wide skirts, mostly pleated, and also voluminous petticoats, for the autumn and winter.

The menace of the new all-German fashion did not escape the eyes of the government, which is taking steps to prevent the resultant squandering of cloth, particularly cotton material.

"It is gratifying to note that our fashion is successfully striving to free itself from French and English leading strings and to pave its own way. Necessity makes us inventive and saving, and so we have been able to cheat the calculations of our enemies by being able to hold out to a victorious end with the necessities of life and warfare. Right has fashion in its new creations, subordinating itself to the highest thought? It took some time to accustom ourselves to the laughably tight gowns of our women and girls, and industry suffered by the fashion. But now, at the same moment when the leaders of the textile industry of the whole empire are consulting with the authorities over ways and means of stretching the stocks of textiles in order to supply the needs of the army and the population for the longest possible time by the wise limitation of consumption—at this moment German fashion, by advertisements and exhibitions, seeks to introduce wide and pleated skirts and underskirts larger than the prevailing mode by from 60 to 80 per cent.

"Can fashion so far transmute over us that when she goes to extremes we must thoughtlessly submit? There is still time to steer clear of the danger. The wholesale suit trade would do well, particularly so far as cotton goods are concerned, to come to the understanding with the government authorities before the government finds itself compelled, through a suitable warning, if necessary, by regulation, to see to it that its measures are not set at naught.

"Our women and girls will certainly not want to lay themselves open to the shame and just reproach of not having adjusted themselves to the demands and spirit of our earnest times. Since in peace times, from sheer whim, they made the most of the use of imaginable dress goods, so may they now consciously, and for the good of the Fatherland, continue so to do."

How far patriots will tighten and shorten skirts is still on the knees of the war gods.

BOHEMIANS IN U. S. DISCARD THE HYPHEN Chicago, Sept. 2.—In a memorial of allegiance to the United States, sent to President Wilson and to the Austrian ambassador at Washington, the Bohemian National Alliance of Americans knocked out "the hyphen" by declaring that "there are no Bohemian-Americans. We owe allegiance to the United States only."

The memorial went to the Austrian representative as a protest against the movement to utilize former subjects of the Austro-Hungarian government in propaganda against export of munitions of war from the United States.

"We emphatically deny the assumption," says the memorial, "that the export of munitions of war violates any way the neutrality of the United States. We express our complete confidence in the government of this republic for its careful and correct attitude toward the one great neutral power, and we repudiate most emphatically the immoral and hypocritical campaign conducted against countries that defend violated Belgium."

P. E. ISLAND RHODES SCHOLAR HOME FROM SERBIA WITH WOUNDS

Roy Leitch Was Fighting With The Brave Serbs—Tells of Wonderful Rally Against Austrians

Charlottetown, P.E.I., Sept. 2.—Roy Leitch, one of the Rhodes scholars from P. E. Island, has arrived from Serbia on a visit to Charlottetown, his native city, on sick leave. He has spent about a year in Serbia and was on the divisional staff of General Stepanovich in the second Serbian army during the war. He was the only Canadian in military service in that country. He took part in the battles of Lasarevatz and Suvobor.

Three days after their defeat at Coocha the Serbians made the most wonderful rally in military history. They abandoned Belgrade, their capital, the line of the Danube and all the rivers and concentrated all their forces on a new line. Then a new spirit came into the army. A supply of ammunition arrived at the psychological moment. Old King Peter left his sick bed and went to the trenches with his five sons. The Serbians fought as they never fought before. Although outnumbered three to one, they drove the Austrians before them and in three days smashed the enemy in the second battle at Suvobor.

Mr. Leitch has been in various parts of the country, generally around Belgrade. He has been in the first line of trenches on several occasions and has seen fighting at close range.

He declares that the Serbians saved the situation in the east as the Belgians did in the west. If they had not driven the Austrians out of the Balkan states, would have gone to the aid of the Teutons and given them a million and a quarter of well trained war injured men.

Mr. Leitch has taken photographs and copious notes and will publish a book in the course of time. He was injured by his horse in the battle of Suvobor and he came home to undergo an operation. He will remain here about four months and then return to the front.
