It was pointed out that unless the Dominion Government takes some early action regarding this service there will be only one sailing a month to the West Indies, while some of the islands, will be entirely cut off from Can-

ada, The Royal Mail Steam Packet Line, which has been operating two ships since the subsidy contract, under which they did business for a number of years, expired early in the season, has notified the Board of Trade that the salling of the Chaleur of their fleet from Halifax Oct. 8, would be the last






