

RENEWAL OF WEST INDIES SERVICE SOUGHT

Halifax Trade Board Meeting Demands Restoration of Fortnightly Sailings

HALIFAX, Sept. 28.—That immediate steps should be taken by the Department of Trade and Commerce to re-establish fortnightly steamship service between Halifax, Saint John and the British West Indies and British Guiana was the gist of a resolution passed by the council of the local Board of Trade today.

It was pointed out that unless the Dominion Government takes some early action regarding this service there will be only one sailing a month to the West Indies, while some of the islands will be entirely cut off from Canada.

The Royal Mail Steam Packet Line, which has been operating two ships since the subsidy contract, under which they did business for a number of years, expired early in the season, has notified the Board of Trade that the sailing of the Chieftain of their fleet from Halifax Oct. 8, would be the last sailing.

PROTESTS RECEIVED

The Board of Trade is in receipt of many protests from the people of the West Indies, pointing out the serious effect the present inadequate steamship service is having on Canadian West India trade relations, and the local body will request the federal authorities to extend the agreement with the Royal Mail Steam Packet Line so that the ships may be kept on the route until such time as it will be possible to put into effect the terms of the recent Canada-West India Treaty.

BIG INCREASE IN MOTOR TOURISTS

3,512 More American Cars Enter Province so Far in 1926

More than a 25 per cent increase is noted in the number of United States cars entering New Brunswick this season to date, by comparison with the number that entered in the corresponding period last year.

The exact figures as supplied by the New Brunswick Automobile Association show that last year up to Sept. 25 there had been 12,658 cars from the United States to enter New Brunswick and this year up to that date the number of cars had amounted to 16,170. At every point of entry, with the exception of Woodstock, larger numbers of cars had entered this year and at Anderson the number was considerably more than that of the number last year.

The exact increase in United States cars this year was 3,512. Nearly half of the United States cars enter this province at St. Stephen. The figures for the different points of entry are as follows:

CONCERT FOR HOSPITAL HAS GREAT SUCCESS

William Heughan Enthusias Large Audience Assembled in Imperial Theatre

At last William Heughan, probably the finest exponent of Scottish folk music, and for that matter the historic melodies of all British peoples, has been heard by a representative Saint John music loving audience. His former appearance in this city was by no means a criterion of the manner in which he is discriminating a place greets so talented an artist, but last evening's concert in Imperial Theatre—a grand audience it was that hailed the visitor artists—made up for former shortcomings and did the golden-throated Scot real proud.

Miss Sayer as well as accorded a hearty reception. The audience applauded and applauded again. Some of the numbers were received with what was almost an ovation. In this demonstration Miss Sayer shared. So varied were Mr. Heughan's selections—selected from a repertoire of hundreds—that it constituted a remarkably fine assembly of folk-songs, grand opera and martial strains. Miss Sayer's piano numbers proved her mistress of the grand instrument.

Mrs. Robert Nichol led the opening devotions, for which the subject was "Prayer." The hymns and scripture portions all dealt with that subject.

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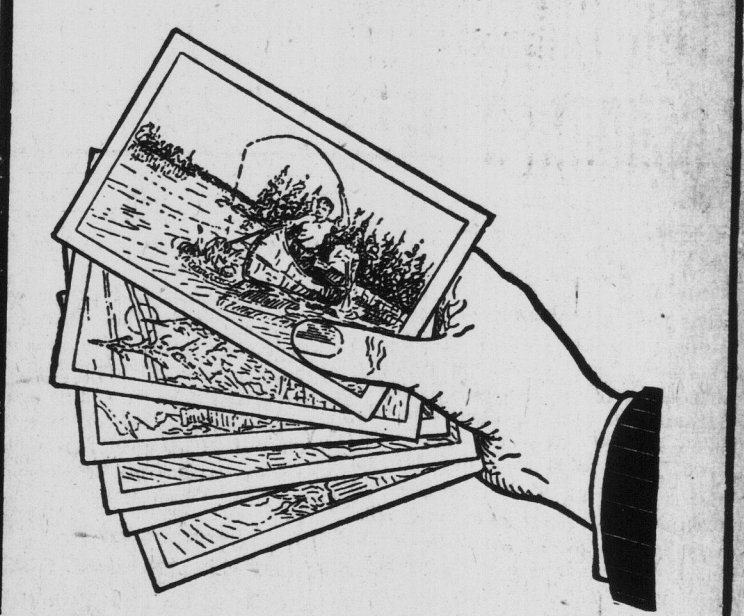
