Montcalm Brings 41 Families, Totalling 208 Souls, as Part Of the 3,000 Family Scheme

Five Are Destined For Points in the Maritime Provinces—
169 Children and 17 Infants on the Ship—Many
Prominent People Aboard

THE CANADIAN PACIFIC steamship Montcalm, which arrived in port Sunday morning from Liverpool had a total of 1,250 passengers, one of the largest lists of the season, in addition to over 2,000 tons of general cargo and a large consignment of mail. The passengers comprised 1,064 adults, 169 children and 17 infants.

Prominent among the passengers after appearing before the Privy Council were the Duchess of Athol, Sir Hugh Allen and Miss Morley Fletcher, of London, who are en route to Montreal to attend the third triennial National Conference of Education; Senator Angus Honourat and Mons J. Bruhnes and E. Gilson, of Paris, who are also going to attend the conference; Col. Towers, K. C., of Toronto; H. de Winton Wigley and M. N. MacGregor, two journalists; Edgar A. Ashcroft, of London, Ont., to visit relatives after serving for 20 years in Nigeria, Africa; and J. E. Day, K. C., of Toronto. Mr. Day is returning to his home

41 FAMILIES ABOARD.

Among the passengers were 41 families, totalling 208 souls. These are part of the 3,000 family scheme and are en route to the Prairie lands in Western Canada to work on the farms. Among the 41 families five were destined to points in the Maritime Provinces. On the steamer there was also a Salvation Army party, comprising 69 people. These were all boys, 53 of which are to go forward to Ontario and 16 to remain in this province. They will proceed to the Army home in Moncton and will be distributed to farms from there.
