WOULD NOT ABANDON BANNER AND STAYED OUT OF THE PARADE

An Incident of Dominion Day Celebration in St. Catharines

St. Catharines, Ont., July 2.—Following a peace parade and demonstration here the Great War Veterans held their Dominion Day celebration and parade in which manufacturers, business men and some labor unions participated. The veterans objected to a banner brought out by striking machinists and molders, not because it declared for a forty-four week, but it carried this declaration:—"We did not betray Belgium, but Borden betrayed us." The G. W. V. A. parade committee took the stand that being a non-political organization such a banner could have no place in their parade. The strikers refused to march without this banner and were thereupon notified to quit the parade, which they did.

PARLIAMENTARY WHIPS' DUTIES

(Spare Moments.)

"A chief whip is the drudge of his party, but a very necessary and valuable drudge," the late Mr. Gladstone remarked on one occasion, and the description conveys a very good idea of the onerous duties of the gentlemen responsible for the mustering of members of the House when divisions are taking place. Practically speaking, the chief government whip is the first to enter the House and the last to leave it, and it needs a man of iron constitution to master the work.

Attached to each party are two principal whips and three or four assistants whose duty it is to keep an eye on the members of their respective parties and see that they attend the House to vote when required. When a government has a large majority, as in the case of the present coalition, the duties of the chief whip are considerably lighter than when they only hold office by a slender majority. But in any case the whip has to be on the alert at all times, for many a government has been overthrown by the inactivity of their whips and the activity of those attached to the opposition.

When once a member enters the House he is watched by the chief whip or his assistants, a policeman and a policeman watches a suspect. A member wishing to leave the House must pass through a quadrangular lobby, with doors on each side. At one of these outlets the whips are posted, and it is an unwritten law of the House that every member must pass through this particular door in order that the whips may learn where he is going.

It often happens that a member will be told by the whip that he cannot leave the House unless he is "paired." That is to say, if a member of the government wishes to go home or to a theatre or dinner, as the case may be, during a sitting when his party may require him, he cannot go unless he gets a friend from the opposition to leave the House, and thus "pair" him, of course a vote is lost to each party, and the member's absence is of no advantage to either.

To become a successful whip necessitates that a man shall not only be energetic but tactful and patient to a degree. He must not only have the programme of the session at his finger-tips, but he must know the peculiar weaknesses and vanities of each member, how to conciliate them when they are apt to think of themselves before their party, and make himself popular in spite of having to carry out disagreeable duties. Officially, the chief government whip is known as patronage secretary to the treasury, and, as such, has control over a certain amount of minor patronage in civil life, and many a chief whip has been heard to declare that his duties as patronage secretary cause him far more trouble than those he is called upon to perform as a whip in the House of Commons.

HISTORIC SERVICE AT OLD PORTLAND POINT

Tonight will be held a historic service, referred to in the Times some days ago, a service in observance of the anniversary of the first religious service to be held in this city, and also later in the same year, the birth of the people of St. John. The sole white population here 150 years ago consisted of the New England Fishing and Trading Company and its dependents.

In 1769 the governor of Nova Scotia sent a delegation to investigate the condition here. It was with this delegation that Rev. Thomas W. Wood came. The trading post was situated on which was known as Portland Point, and there the first religious service was held on the arrival of Rev. Mr. Thomas Wood. The first Anglican church, was built within a stone's throw of the point, and was later moved to the present site of St. Luke's. This church was built on the site of the old site.

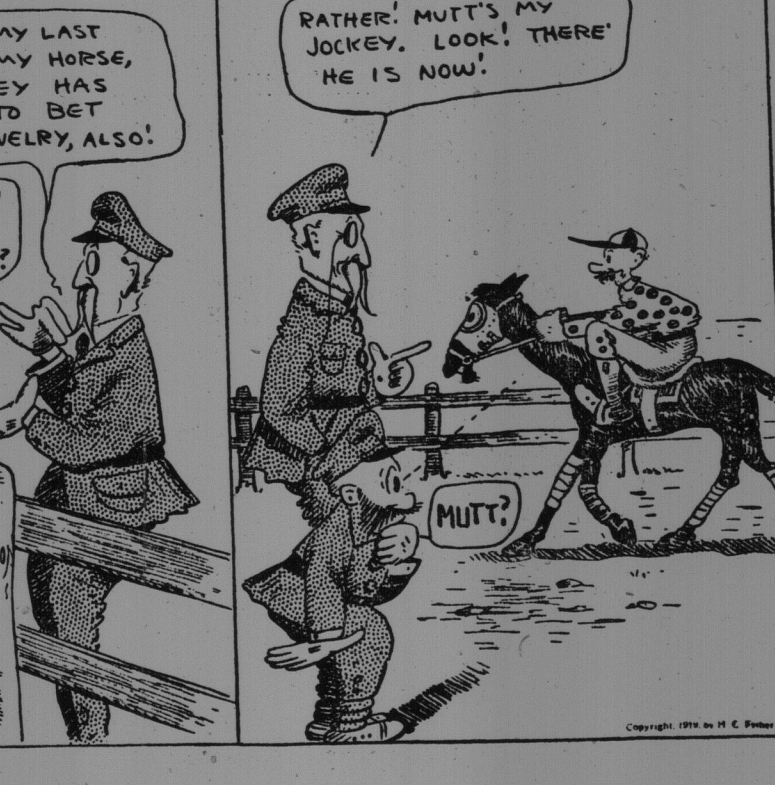
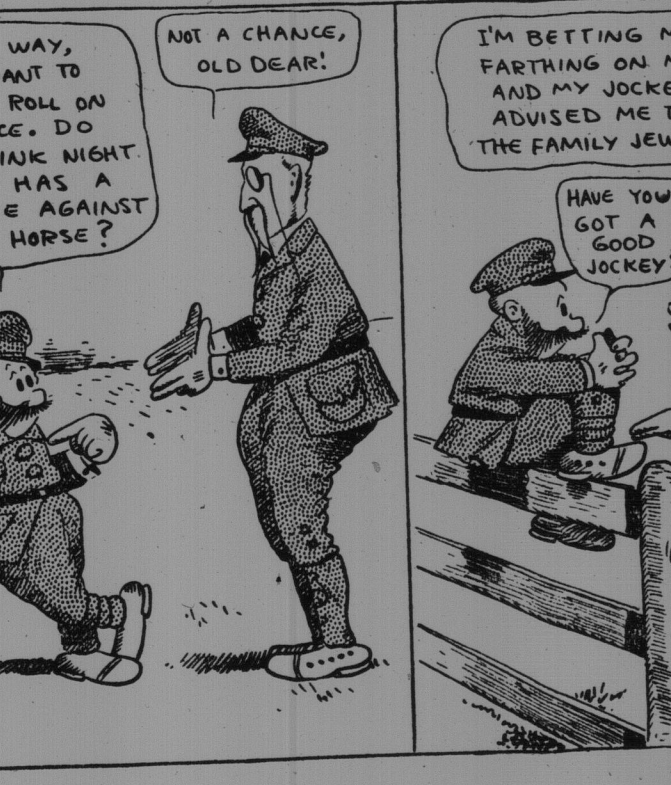
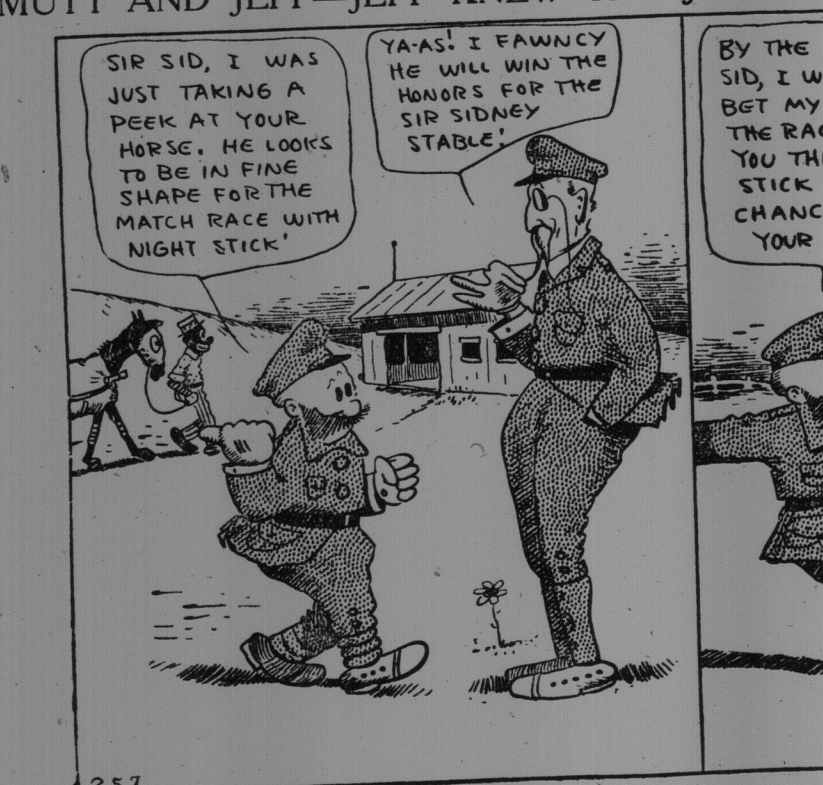
