## WOULD NOT ABANDON BANNER AND STAYED OUT OF THE PARADE

An Incident of Dominion Day Celebration in St. Catharines

St. Catharines, Ont., July 2.—Following a peace parade and demonstration here the Great War Veterans held their Dominion Day celebration and parade in which manufacturers, business men and some labor unions participated. The veterans objected to a banner brought out by striking machinists and moulders, but because it declared for a forty-four week, but it carried this declaration:—"We did not betray Belgium, but Borden betrayed us." The G. W. V. A. parade committee took the stand that being a non-political organization such a banner could have no place in their parade. The strikers refused to march without this banner and were thereupon notified to quit the parade, which they did.

## PARLIAMENTARY WHIPS' DUTIES

(Spare Moments.)

"A chief whip is the drudge of his party, but a very necessary and valuable drudge," the late Mr. Gladstone remarked on one occasion, and the description conveys a very good idea of the onerous duties of the gentlemen responsible for the mustering of members of the House when divisions are taking place. Practically speaking, the chief government whip is the first to enter the House and the last to leave it, and it needs a man of iron constitution to master the work.

In 1769 the governor of Nova Scotia sent a delegation to investigate the conditions here. It was with this delegation that Rev. Thomas W. Wood came. The lieutenant-governor, the premier, Chief Justice Hazen, the mayor and council have been invited to present, and will be called upon to speak. St. Mary's Band and the united choirs of the Anglican churches of the city will assist with the music.
