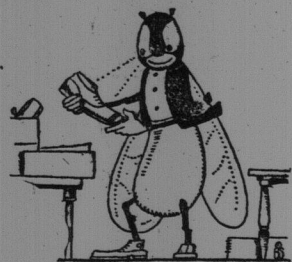

RECENT DEATHS
Mrs. Agnes M. Law
Yarmouth, July 22—Mrs. Agnes M. Law, widow of Bowman Brown Law, former M. P. for Yarmouth, died at her home here this afternoon at the age of sixty-two years. It will be remembered that the late Mr. Law lost his life in the fire which destroyed the parliament buildings at Ottawa, three years ago. His death was a severe shock to Mrs. Law who mourned her loss deeply and for the last few months she had been in failing health.

LOCAL NEWS

Employees of the New Brunswick Power Company who are union men, at a recent meeting decided not to accept the company's offer to elect one of their number as a member of the board of directors of the company at present. A regular meeting of the union is to be held in six months when the matter will be talked over again.

The W. C. T. U. met yesterday afternoon with Mrs. David Hipwell presiding. Mrs. Seymour and Mrs. N. H. Lawson led in prayer. Mrs. J. O'Brien, who has just returned from New York, said there was a great improvement in the morals of the people of New York and Boston since the closing of the saloons.

R. G. McAfee and his wife, who was Miss Morrison of this city, arrived here last evening from the South Sea Islands, after twelve years' sojourn in missionary work. Their two children were born in the islands and up to the time of their journey home had seen very few white people. Mr. McAfee said that the natives were similar in many ways to the aborigines of Australia, being of the very lowest type. Mr. McAfee has no plans for the future, but he says that he will not return to New York. Mr. and Mrs. McAfee are visiting Mrs. McAfee's relatives in 327 Princess street.

WATCHMEN AND BONUS.

To the Editor of the Times:
Sir,—I noticed in an evening paper published here that all government employees do not benefit in receiving a share of the bonus which has been allotted by the Dominion government. This bonus I am given to understand was awarded so as to meet the increase in living expenses owing to the increased cost of commodities. Why is it that the watchmen employed on the government wharves at West St. John are not receiving any benefit? Surely it is not the intention of the authorities to omit these men, whose wages are considerably less than \$1,000 a year. Ten million dollars is the sum to be appropriated again, so surely some one will see to it that these watchmen be included so as to make the remuneration they receive something near a living wage.

No man should get less than \$4 a day in these times but the watchmen are getting only \$2.75 a day and a married man cannot exist on that amount. It is said that a dollar is worth 100 cents but not when you buy bread, milk and boots, etc., as it buys only about thirty cents worth of these things.

Considering that this port has come through the whole period of the war without mishap when the sheds have had all kinds of explosives in them, is it too much to ask that watchmen receive a living wage—or at least receive the bonus which the government has set aside for only some of its employees?

Higher Phone Rates

Halifax, July 22.—The board of public utilities has ordered a new scale of rates to be charged by the Maritime Telegraph and Telephone Company amounting to about twenty per cent. increase. It will yield about \$180,000 additional revenue, of which \$155,000 is to be paid in increased wages and the balance is consumed in taxes that have been levied since the war began in 1914.

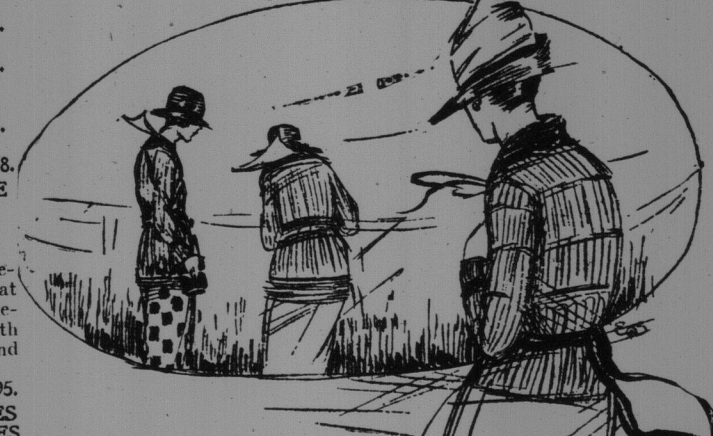

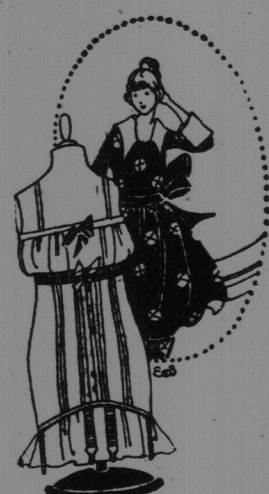
