Frederickton, N. B., Nov. 14—George Hyde, an old resident of the Twenty-second Regiment, died this morning after a lingering illness, aged seventy-eight.

New York, Nov. 14—A bomb somewhat similar in construction to the one that wrecked the entrance to the Bronx County Court House, last Wednesday, was found in the Tombs court room.

Just under the offices of Governor-elect Whitman today. The room was crowded. The bomb contained gun-powder, a slug and bullets. Its fuse was partly burned. George O'Connor, a policeman, saw smoke from the burning fuse of the bomb, ran to the spot, picked up the missile, tore off the fuse, and carried the bomb from the court room.
