It has long been evident to a stranger within the gates that the streets of the metropolis, owing to the reckless ruffianism of the drivers of taxicabs and omnibuses, are the most perilous in Europe. While the police are very ready to pull up drivers of private automobiles they pay no heed to the criminal recklessness of public drivers.

Under the caption, "The Reign of Terror," John Lloyd, J.P., advertised recently asking for the formation of a strong society to protect life and secure safety in the streets. There is no doubt that the hourly risk of traffic dodging are reaching a point at which action by the authorities is imperative.

There are now 2,000 motor buses in London, and 1913 will find the total swollen to 4,500, while the cheapening of automobiles and the taxicab habit will be responsible for 5,000 more.

The gravity of the problem may be seen from the fact that in the year 1911 more than 400 people were killed in the streets of London, including quite a number of Americans. The Rev. Dr. Wolf of Brooklyn was the latest victim. Of these 400 deaths, automobiles and taxicabs were responsible for 165 and motor buses for 107. The electric tramways killed 28.
