WORK TOLD OF AT ANNUAL MEETING

Moncton Clergyman Speaks
on Life of Wm.
Tindale

Hon. J. G. Forbes, who has been president of the New Brunswick Bible Society for 20 years, retired from office at the annual meeting yesterday and was elected as honorary president, Judge George Henderson being chosen as the new president. A committee is preparing some suitable recognition of Judge Forbes' splendid service to the society during his long term in office.

The annual meeting was also the observance of the 40th anniversary of the first printed English translation of the Bible by William Tindale, and at the public gathering in St. David's church last night Rev. J. A. Ramsay, of Moncton gave an eloquent address telling of the life and work of Tindale.

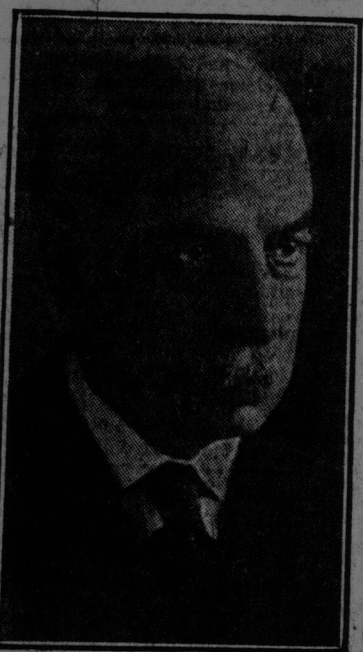

INCREASE IN WORK.
Rev. J. M. Murchison, field secretary, reported a great increase in colporteur work in the last year, 16,012 copies of the scriptures having been distributed in 1925 as compared with 7,768 in the previous year. He warmly commended the colporteurs, W. H. Crossley, H. Blake, Jamieson, Murray Brown and Ernest Bradley, and paid a tribute to the work of the Bible women, Miss Henderson and Miss Wesley, in Saint John. As ill health had prevented Miss Wesley from carrying on the active work, Miss Mary Hoyt was assisting her. Rev. Dr. R. Heine had charge of the immigration work in Saint John in the winter time and in summer was engaged in colporteur work, while Rev.

E. R. MacWilliam took charge of the work for the West Indies boats in summer. Mr. Murchison spoke of the value of the work of presenting scriptures to foreigners coming to Canada who, not having their own newspapers, would devote more time to the reading of the Bible, which was one of the best means of building up a righteous citizenship. He commended the work of Miss Agnes Montgomery as office secretary.

CITY GIFTS BELOW 1924.
With reference to the finances of the year Mr. Murchison said that city contributions up to the present time were below those of the previous year but rural contributions were above those of the previous year. With many centres still to be heard from provincial contributions amounted to \$8,865.61 and city contributions to \$4,494.80. The total amount with other sums was \$13,360.41. He referred to the great encouragement received from the announcement that the late William Crawford had made a bequest in favor of the society. Stock purchased in 1925 was valued at \$5,459.95 as compared with \$363.84 in 1924. The value of scriptures distributed in 1925 was valued at \$2,281.70 in 1924 to \$2,182.37 in 1925. Sales at the Bible House totaled \$936.82.

PICTURES RENAISSANCE.
Mr. Ramsay pictured for his audience the Renaissance period in which William Tindale was born and spoke of the ignorance and wickedness Tindale had found among the ecclesiastical leaders of his day in England. His soul had been so gripped that he had uttered his famous words: "If God will spare my life, ere many years I will cause the boy who drove the plough to know more of scriptures than do you." Mr. Ramsay described how this man who had been called the greatest human being since the apostolic days, had pursued his self-appointed task and though driven into exile had carried it through to completion, eventually to suffer martyrdom at the stake in a foreign land. He spoke of the beauty of Tindale's translation which had been but very little altered in 400 years and declared that all the light that had broken upon the Anglo-Saxon race could be traced to the Tindale Bible. What Tindale had done for English-speaking peoples in the world, he urged his hearers to assist in doing for the world a larger service by sending everywhere the gospel in the language of the people.
