

Q. Did you have regular employment at Taber, Alberta?

A. Very regular during the summer months and in the winter it wasn't so very good.

Q. Didn't you have to make a return to the National Selective Service Board? Didn't you as an employee have to do that or did your employer make a return?

A. For just odd jobs it wasn't necessary to apply to the Selective Service for any such work.

Q. In this letter of September 6th, 1945, the writer, R. English, mentioned the fact that you were discharged because of illegal absence. Did you receive notification from the Military District at Regina that you had been discharged?

A. Pardon sir?

Q. I said did you get word from M.D. 12 Regina that you had been discharged?

A. No, sir.

Q. You didn't receive word from Regina that you had been discharged.

A. No, sir, none whatever.

Q. So from the summer of 1943 until February 1945 you lived at Taber.

A. Yes, sir.

Q. Did you get permission to move from Swift Current Saskatchewan to Taber, Alberta, from the National Selective Service Board at Regina?

A. No, sir.

The Defending Officer declines to re-examine.

Questioned by the Court:

Q. What did you give as your home address when you reported and enrolled in the army?

A. Box 344, Swift Current.

Q. Where was your wife living at the time?

A. She was staying part of the time with my folks and at other times for a few days at a time she was staying with some relatives North of the city. Their name I don't know.
