schooner E. B. Marvin arrived from the north, having been seized by the United States cutter Rush and turned over to the Nymphe, the latter giving the Marvin orders to sail direct for this port and remain here. The Marvin was notified at Sand Point by the Rush that sealing was prohibited in the sea, and, after being furnished with a copy of the proclemation of President Harrison, was ordered not to attempt to go into Behring Sea under penalty of seizure. No attention was paid to the warning and Captain McDougall sailed for the sea, determined to wait until notified by a British vessel. He was overhauled at Ounalaska afterwards by the Rush and taken captive. The schooner was turned over by the Rush to the Nymyhe, who ordered Captain McDougall to proceed here and wait further orders. The Marvin's officers say that nearly every schooner has received notice, and they will certainly be seized if they attempt to enter the sea after being warned.

The Marvin brought news that July 7 the sealer La Nymphe of San Francisco was fired on by the Thetis between St. George and St. Paul Island. She tried to escape from the Thetis, but was brought up by a shot. Another schooner, name unknown, was also fired
