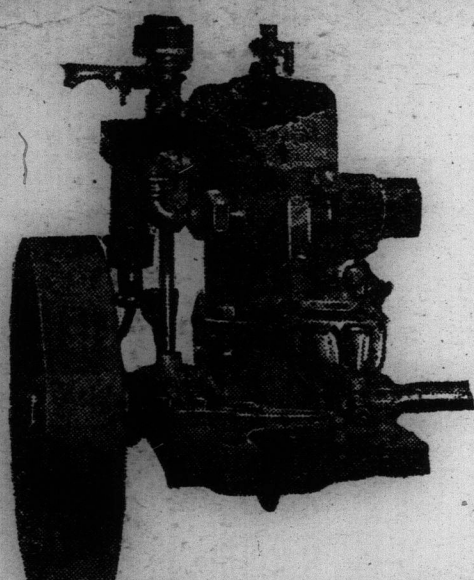

Let The Good Work Go On

Another appeal is to be made to the public spirited residents of Bay Roberts and vicinity, and, as it is one which should find its way into the innermost recesses of the hearts of those who are nourished by the milk of human kindness, we feel assured the response will be prompt and generous.

The great war is far-reaching in its ravages and demands; but we have put our hand to the plow; we cannot be drawn-hearted and turn back; we must pay the full price, dear though it be, in order to make the final victory a lasting, glorious monument to our zeal and self-sacrifice.

Our regiment at the front has suffered heavy casualties. Many of Newfoundland's best and bravest sons who were serving either with "Our" or with Canadian regiments, among them loved ones from Bay Roberts, now sleep beneath the blood stained fields of France.

The list of wounded is long, and the need of funds for the upkeep of cots in the hospitals great. Are we going to be behind in this matter? Shall we prove recreant to the duty that is set before us? We dare not! We must not!!

A mass meeting of citizens was called in the Public Building on Wednesday night last for the purpose of considering this matter, but, while there was a large gathering of ladies present, we regret to state the gentlemen did not attend in the force that the exigencies of the cause demanded.

We cannot believe that it was because of indifference, or lack of the spirit of patriotism; but, whatever the cause, the fact remains that there should have been a better attendance.

The meeting was called to order at 8 o'clock by Mr. John Jardine, J. P., who read a telegram from Sir W. H. Horwood, stating the need that existed for an additional supply of cots, and asking that Bay Roberts guarantee to supply one or more.

He then called on Mr. C. E. Russell, who, in a brief speech, outlined the object of the meeting, and made a touching reference to the fact that some of our residents had been bereaved of their sons, while others of our boys are now in hospital demanding our care.

Adjutant Ellsworth, S. A., was then called to the platform, and made a brief speech. He was followed by Mr. J. D. Ford, who also spoke briefly. Both these gentlemen sought to emphasize the fact that action speaks louder than words. Miss Parsons, Pres. of the W. P. A., also briefly addressed the gathering.

On motion of Constable Wells, seconded by Mr. Geo. Jardine, Mr. C. E. Russell was elected Secretary-Treasurer, when the following business was transacted.—The meeting decided, on behalf of the citizens of Bay Roberts and vicinity, to send a message to Chief Justice Horwood, guaranteeing the upkeep of one or more cots for our wounded soldiers for one year.

The whole section was then divided up into wards and a number of ladies and gentlemen volunteered to call on the citizens for their subscriptions. These collectors form the committee, who will meet in the public building at 8 o'clock Saturday night to finalize arrangements in reference to the collections, which will be made next week.

Latest War News

Not Worried

London, July 19.—"We really are not worried by the war," said Sir William Robertson in an interview with an Associated Press correspondent. "As to the new offensive, a glance at the map will tell the story of the progress."

Germans in Delville Wood

London, July 19.—The Germans have recaptured a portion of Delville Wood and obtained a footing in the northern outskirts of Longueval, the War Office announced today.

Recapture of Longueval

London, July 19.—British troops have recaptured the village of Longueval, and in Delville Wood, most of the ground taken by the Germans on Tuesday night, according to a British official tonight. Hard fighting is still in progress in this region. South of Delville Wood this afternoon, we dispersed with our fire a large body of Germans massing to attack Waterloo farm from the direction of Ghuillemont.

French Official

Paris, July 19.—The French made some progress last night on the Verdun front in the course of hand grenade fighting in the vicinity of Fleury, says today's official report. Artillery actions continue in this district. A German raid in the region of Paschendaal, Belgium, was checked by the French fire, as was a raid north of the Aisne near Paeszy.

Russians Cross Carpathians

London, July 19.—The Russians have crossed the Carpathians and have penetrated a day's march into Hungary, according to a despatch from Petrograd. The despatch says that the Russians are threatening the Austrian rear in the mountains. The advance is being made, according to this information, by armies of General Letchitzky, which are again on the move after an interval of quiet.

From Berlin

Berlin, July 19.—The Russians have been strongly reinforced along the front south and south west of Riga, at the northern end of the Russian line, and have been heavily attacking Von Hindenburg's forces there. War Office announced today that these assaults all failed, and that the Russians suffered unusually severe losses.

Russians Forging Ahead

Petrograd, July 19.—Russian infantry in Galicia is advancing towards the passes of the Carpathians which lead into Hungary. Further north in the marsh region, an official statement today says, an attempt by the Austro-German forces to take the offensive was broken: In the Caucasus the Russians have made further progress.

Last week in referring to the poor service given to Bay Roberts by the Postal Telegraphs in the matter of supplying the public with war news, we omitted to state that the Anglo American Co. has been pains taking in its endeavor to furnish us with news. Our citizens will appreciate that fact.

James Hunt, George Strickland, John Strickland (brothers), and Philip Hunt, all of H. Briton, the men who strayed away from the banker Metamora, landed at Bay Bulls on Wednesday, after battling with the winds and waves for five days and nights.

College Extension Lectures

PRELIMINARY NOTICE

Courses of lectures covering the requirements of the Licentiate in Arts of the Council of Higher Education and of the second, or Sophomore year, in certain Canadian Universities, will be organized for the next Academic year, beginning October 1st, 1916, and ending April 30th, 1917. The following, and possibly other subjects will be included:—English, Mathematics, Latin, French, Physics, Chemistry, Geology and Mineralogy.

Candidates passing successfully through such of these courses of lectures as are required for the Second Year in Arts in the Universities, will be admitted as Third Year students in the Universities, provided they are otherwise qualified. Each of the lecture courses will be open to qualified students whether they have graduation in view or not.
