HORSE KILLED.

An Exciting Runaway and a Bad Spill on King Street.

At about half past one this afternoon a bad runaway accident occurred on King street.

Fred Harper, London, was being driven westward behind one of Geo. Lamperd's teams when the pole of the carriage dropped; a spill occurred in which Mr. Harper and the driver were thrown out. Breaking clear of the rig the team set out toward the post office corner. There they literally ran down the team attached to Mr. Bennett's back, as it was coming off Fourth street.

When the runaways struck Bennett's team the latter were forced to the ground and in less time than it takes to tell it the four horses were struggling on the pavement, Lamperd's team passing clear over Bennett's. The poll of Mr. Bennett's back was snapped off short, the harness slightly broken and his horse bruised. Otherwise his outfit escaped injury. Lamperd's gray horse was very badly hurt, and died in a few minutes. In the excitement J. H. Stringer's driver took a dash but was stopped by the time it reached the Montana house.

DEADLY SHELLS.

They Carry Death and Destruction to the Winslow.

Little Torpedo Boat Disabled—Four of Her Crew Killed and Many Wounded.

Key West, Fla., May 12.—There was an engagement off Cardenas, near Matanzas, yesterday, at 1 o'clock in the afternoon. The United States cruiser Wilmington, Commander C. C. Todd; the torpedo boat Winslow, and the auxiliary gunboat Hudson were engaged.

The American dead are: Ensign Worth Bagley, John Ververis, oiler; J. V. Meeks, fireman; John Demese, fireman.

The wounded are: R. E. Cox, gunner's mate; D. McKeon, quartermaster; J. Patterson, fireman; F. Gray, Lieut. J. B. Bernadow, Josiah Tannett, cabin cook. All are slightly wounded, except Patterson, whose condition is serious.

THE ENGAGEMENT took place inside the harbor of Cardenas. The gunboat Wilmington, the torpedo boat Winslow and the gunboat Hudson were the only vessels engaged. They entered the harbor for the purpose of attacking some Spanish gunboats which were known to be there. These latter, however, were not discovered by the American force until the Spaniards opened fire. The land batteries of Cardenas supported the fire of the Spanish gunboats.

The engagement commenced at 2:05 p. m. and lasted for about an hour. The gunboat Hudson came up to the government dock at 8 o'clock this morning with the bodies of five men lying on her after deck. The bodies were covered by the stars and stripes.

HOT WORK. The battle, while it lasted, was terrific. The Wilmington and the Hudson were ahead and opened fire on the Spanish boats which were lying at the docks. The firing began at a range of 2,500 yards.

A few minutes later the Winslow came up and also opened fire. In an instant the entire attention of the Spanish fleet and land batteries was directed upon her. From all sides shot and shell seemed to pour in upon the little torpedo boat.

The Wilmington and the Hudson still kept up their fire, but they could not turn aside the terrible storm of fire and death pouring in upon the torpedo boat.

BOILER KNOCKED OUT. The crew of the Winslow, however, never faltered for a moment. At 2:30 p. m. a solid shot crashed into the hull of the Winslow and knocked out her boiler. In an instant she began to roll and drift helplessly. Then came a moment of awful suspense. A fierce cheer of triumph went up from the Spaniards on the gunboats and in the batteries, and again a storm of fire was opened up on the helpless boat.

The gunboat Hudson, which was lying near by, started to the assistance of the Winslow. She ran alongside the torpedo boat and tried to throw a line to the imperiled crew.

GOOD GUNNERY. Up to this time, with the exception of the shot which disabled the boiler of the Winslow, the firing of the Spanish gunboats had been wild, but as the Winslow lay rolling in the water the range drew closer and shells began to explode all about her.

It was difficult for the Hudson to get near enough to throw a line to the Winslow's crew, so terrible was the fire all about her. Finally, after about 20 minutes, the Hudson approached near enough to throw a line.

A DEADLY SHELL.

Ensign Bagley and six men were standing on the deck of the Winslow. "Heave her! Heave her!" shouted Bagley, as he looked toward the commander of the Hudson and called for a line.

"Don't miss it," shouted an officer from the Hudson, and with a smile Bagley called back: "Let her come. It's getting too hot here for comfort."

The line was thrown and, at the same instant, a shell burst in the very midst of the group of men on board the Winslow.

Finally the larger boat succeeded in towing the disabled craft out of the harbor. The Winslow was found to be badly crippled, and it will take several weeks to repair her. What damage was done to the Spaniards is unknown.

A SPY'S SUICIDE. Washington, May 12.—George Downing, the Spanish spy arrested here several days ago, committed suicide this morning by hanging himself at the barracks where he was confined.

Hong Kong, May 12.—The British second-class gun vessel Lynnet has arrived here with seven from the Philippine islands. She left Manila on Monday last and reports that the insurgents are uncontrollable. The whole country appears to be in a state of anarchy, and Rear Admiral Dewey is powerless to restore order.

The application of the A. O. F. for a Dominion charter passed the committee at Ottawa on condition that the society raised its rates to provide a surplus reserve. The representatives of the order agreed to do so. On a similar application the representatives of the Sons of England refused to make any raise. Their application also passed.
