Changing Name of Ship That Mutinied-Scarching for Sunken Mines.

The Black Sea fleet, practically all

that remains of the Russian navy, is within a throw of the much quoted ship's biscuit, writes the Sebastopol correspondent of the London Express. There are six men-o'-war, heavy, sinister, green painted, throwing forth much smoke, which in the absence of wind spreads and sprawls over the most fortified town in the world like a crape pall. The torpedo nets are out; the long snouted guns are uncovered, give the dull glint of scraped lead. There are men in the fo'c'sles gyrating red flags. Then other trumpets blare. A little to the back as though in disgrace and freshly fired, hiccoughing the blackest smoke, is the Pantelei-mon. It is very likely that if you look through a list of Russian warships you will find no reference to the Panthe Potemkin, the ship which mutin-ied, sailed the Black Sea with the red flag of revolution at the masthead, and bombarded Odessa. The Panteleimon is the Potemkin rechristened.
