DIÇK BLAMES UNION FOR TRADE DEPRESSION

Rumors of Strike Have Cut **Down Their Contracts**

Competition of American Operators Has Also Lessened Their Output-

Mr. Dick gave a general statement of conditions in the coal trade in the Dominion, which he stated was almost wholly due to the strenuous efforts put forth during the past year by American coal operators in an endeavor to capture the St. Lawrence coal trade. Mr. Dick's evidence was for the purpose of showing that the duliness of the coal trade was the chief cause for the company reducing their output and thereby necesitating the laying off of men at their collieries. He said some of their largest contracts for coal last year have been lost to American companies, which also accounted for slack work at their collieries this winter. Among other contracts lost by them owing to American competition were the Montreal Gas and Coke Company of 125,000 tone and the saie for over 50,00 to smaller consumers had been lost through competition of American anthracite dealers. American agents had also secured contracts for 48,00 tons for the Montreal cament works and 20,000 tons petition of American acquate had also secured contracts for 48,00 tons for the Montreal cament works and 20,000 tons to a large esteamship concern at Quiebec. He said as the result of the depression in the coal trade and the inability of the company to set contracts closed in time to start banking carly there had already been a decrease this year in the seles of Nova Bootia coal of over helf a million tons, which affected the Dominion Coal Company more than any other company. The Dominion Coal Company's business up to March showed a decrease of over 371,000 tons compared with last year. Mr. Dick said that owing to the labor agritation and reports sent out from Glace Bay as to the probability of a strike many consumers of coal are anxious naturally about future supply, many of whom are fiolding back and decining to sign contracts until they know whether the coal companies will be in a position to furnish their requirements. This was working to the advantage of the American coal companies, who are using it as an argument to consumers to induce them to close contracts for American coal, basing their arguments on newspaper reports that the Nova Scotta mines will not be able to supply the coal.



General Manager Duggan said it was always a rule of the company that shot firers or any person having control of a number of men would be classed as officials and not eligible for membership in- any labor organizations. He advised his officials not to discriminate against officials not to discriminate against officials of the U. M. W. He stated in answer to a question of counsel for the U. M. W. that it would make no difference in their stand against the U. M. W. if they knew that the organization were in complete control of their workmen. They regard the action of the men at No. 2 as a strike, though they had made no public refusal to it, as they had no desire to inflame their men or give the matter any more publicity tham it had received. He did not think the majority of the men were in favor of the U. M. W. Judge Wallace read a letter from Mr. Duggan enclosing telegrams from the managers of the Cumberland Coal Company, N. S. Steel and Coal Company, the Maccan and the Joggins collieries stating that they had not recognized the U. M. W.
