

LORD DUNDONALD'S FAREWELL

Tells How His Work Has Been Hampered, His Report, a Public Document, Was Suppressed by the Minister of Militia—He Was Forced to Unload a Lot of Extra Colonels on the Country—Was Fully Aware of the Gravity of His Statement in Montreal

MONTREAL, June 19.—Lord Dundonald has issued a statement to the public concerning his resignation. After a few introductory remarks he says:

"I was fully aware of the gravity of the step which I took in making a public protest. I was fully aware that it was an unusual step. I decided to take it because I was convinced that it was the only means of serving the militia of Canada."

After a recital to the nature of his work, he continues: "In all of my work I have endeavored to keep steadily in view the nature of my post. I have not sought to impose my policy upon the minister or upon the cabinet. I have sought to carry out the plans approved by the government. In the technical administration of the force I held that I should be given a fairly free hand. At the same time I was careful to ascertain and consider the views of all persons interested. I claimed a smaller measure of freedom than is accorded to the general managers of important commercial companies. To make a railway pay it is necessary to leave the detail matters of administration largely to the expert official in charge of the system. Managing a military force is expert work, and the safety of the country is surely as important as the success of a railway. My claim for freedom extended only to the technical side of my work. I had no desire to force my policy upon the minister.

In my efforts I was continually hampered by interference in that part of my work. That interference began very soon after my arrival. It was continued incessantly ever since. Mr. Fisher's interest in the affairs of the Scottish Dragoons was simply a final incident in a long list of various phases of obstruction.

My reason for remaining at my post was to benefit the military of Canada, but my efforts were so persistently blocked that I came to look upon the case as a hopeless one. I was forced to give warning of the certain danger before it was too late.

I might have lodged an official protest with the government. I cannot say that this would have done any avail. It would have been simply one more document in the pigeon hole.

A course offering many attractions was to resign and issue a public statement of my reasons. So far as I personally was concerned it would have been by far the easier and more pleasant course. So I did it. I would give neither the government nor the people of Canada any real opportunity to pass judgment upon a matter brought to their attention. My protest would have been made, it is true, but not in a manner that would have attracted attention to the evil.

It seemed to me to make a public protest and to leave with the government the option of heading it or of continuing a system which is destructive to efficiency in the public service. I was in this frame of mind when Mr. Fisher's interference with the 13th Scottish Light Dragoons came to a

head. It precipitated my resolution to speak out, no matter what the consequences.

Lord Dundonald then proceeds to give specific instances of "autocratic and unusual interference with the machinery which I was supposed to control."

"One extremely serious case of interference was the suppression of an important part of my first annual report on the militia. For convenience of reference I divided my report for the year 1902 into two halves.

Part I was simply a diary of events. Part 2 contained my description of the condition of the militia and an outline of a comprehensive scheme for reorganizing the force on lines suitable to the country.

This part was fully intended by me for publication. It contained nothing that could be described as military secrets. It covered matter such as is constantly made public in Great Britain and the United States. In my judgment it was information as to the actual conditions and the possibilities of the militia, which it was desirable for the people of Canada to know. This part of the report Sir Frederick Borden suppressed against my protest.

"In the house of commons at various times he described this part of my report as 'private,' 'confidential,' and 'secret.' It was marked neither 'private,' 'confidential' nor 'secret.' When the minister made these statements he had been explicitly informed by me that I desired his publication. He went so far on one occasion as to compare my report to a secret report on Canadian defence. With that report my report had no analogy.

"When I presented my report for 1903 Sir Frederick Borden told me that certain portions were too strong and might embarrass him.

"I modified it and again sent it in. Without further reference to me he struck out whole pages and separate paragraphs, all of which were of a nature that should be made public. Among the portions he eliminated were references to the condition of the permanent staff, which I pronounced in many respects unsatisfactory.

"A more recent instance occurred in connection with the organization of the 13th Scottish Light Dragoons. The establishment of this corps was fixed at colonel, second in command with rank of lieutenant colonel, and three lieutenant colonels. This was a large establishment but I would have recommended had I been unhampered, but Sir Frederick Borden was anxious to have a smaller establishment and highly paid posts, and the scheme he desired was carried out. Soon after that I went to the Northwest. As soon as I had left Ottawa the minister of militia ordered the adjutant general to prepare an order increasing the number of lieutenant colonels to five, thus giving seven officers of the rank of lieutenant colonel. My objection to this was that one hundred men. In this connection it must be remembered that the most elementary requirements of the militia were neglected for want of money."

Lord Dundonald touches upon the case of Col. Gregory, of the 2nd Dragoons, and then refers to the Eastern Townships regiment. Continuing, he says: "I may also note the peculiar coincidence, by which Mr. Fisher was acting minister of militia on the very day on which this case came up. I do not remember any previous instance of his acting for the minister of militia. The case of the light dragoons was pending on the 16th of May, the minister struck out from the Gazette the list of names submitted to him by me on the ground that further consideration was needed. On the very next

day that further consideration was given by the very man whom Sir Frederick Borden had called upon me to make a strong opponent of. Dr. Pickett, the arbitrator, by whose decision the council would be guided.
