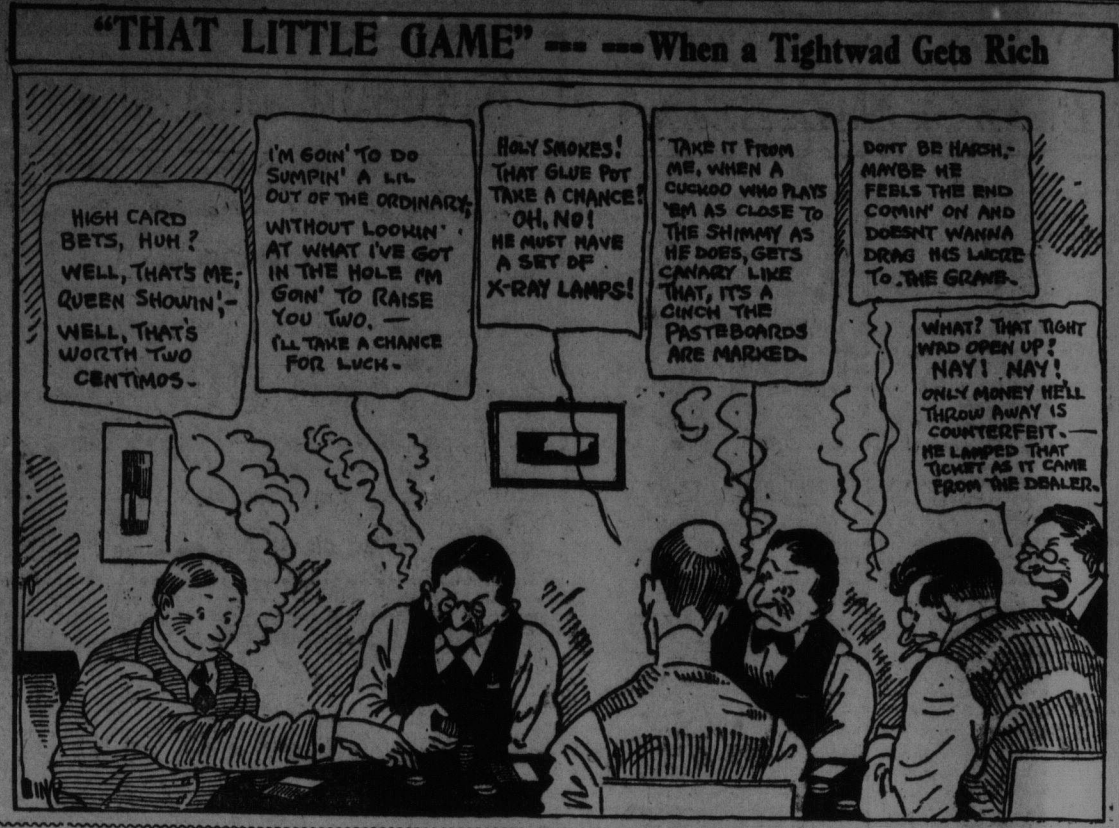

**COMMON COUNCIL**  
**MET IN COMMITTEE**

Tenders Opened Yesterday for New Tail Shaft for Ferry Steamer. Matter of Placing Fountain on Brussels Street Was Discussed.

The common council met in committee yesterday morning. Commissioner Bullock presiding in the absence of the mayor who is in Halifax attending the reception to the Prince of Wales.

Tenders were opened for a new tail shaft for the ferry steamer Governor Carleton to replace that damaged a few days ago. The figures were as follows: Union Foundry and Machine Co. \$450; Phoenix Foundry, \$410; St. John Iron Works \$350. It was decided to recommend the St. John Iron Works tender.

A resolution was passed instructing the controller to pay the local vocational committee \$5,000, the city's grant.

Commissioner Fisher brought up the matter of placing of the fountain donated by the Women's Institute in Brussels street. The city engineer, he said, had recommended that the fountain be placed at one side of the "island" forty feet long and twelve feet wide running parallel with Union street, at the junction of Brussels street. The fountain was to be on the Brussels street side and placed so that vehicles stopping there would not interfere with street car traffic. The fountain was to be the same height as an ordinary curb. He said that the suggestion would be placed before a meeting of the ladies this week, and the public works and water departments were prepared to go ahead with the work so soon as the ladies had decided on their plans. The work of setting up is to be done at the expense of the city. A public drinking fountain and two places for dogs to drink are also included in the fountain arrangement.

**FUNERALS.**  
The funeral of the late Louis Comeau took place from the residence of his brother-in-law, J. V. Bourque, Main street, Shediac, at 9:30 o'clock yesterday morning. The pall-bearers were Dr. P. X. Comeau, Caraquet; Thomas, Comeau, Moncton, brothers of deceased; John O'Regan and H. J. Sheehy, St. John, and F. J. Robinson and Senator Poirier, Shediac. A very large crowd of people of all denominations attended the funeral.

Spiritual and floral offerings were numerous from all parts of the Maritime Provinces. Interment took place in the family lot in St. Joseph's cemetery, Shediac. Requiem Mass High Mass was celebrated by Rev. D. J. LeBlanc, assisted by Rev. Anthony LeBlanc as deacon and Rev. T. Martineau as sub-deacon. Full choir in attendance, with Dr. Omer Comeau, of St. John, nephew of the deceased, presiding at the organ. The large church was filled to its full capacity and the funeral was one of the largest ever held in Shediac.

**PROPOSED FEDERATION.**  
A correspondent in Toronto who has been taking up actively the matter of confederation between Canada and the British West Indies, has written to the local Board of Trade asking that they give consideration to the matter and assist if possible in bringing about the union. The writer enclosed clippings of West Indian and Canadian papers advocating the proposed federation.

**OBITUARY**  
George C. Trenholm

Moncton, N. B., Nov. 24.—George C. Trenholm, a native of Moncton and well known in Dartmouth, N. S., where he had been accountant with the Acadia Sugar Refining Co. for some fifteen years, died at his home here this evening after being in failing health for the last two years. Mr. Trenholm was 67 years of age and was unmarried. When the Moncton Sugar Refinery was destroyed by fire some fifteen or eighteen years ago Mr. Trenholm,

who was the accountant, was transferred to the Woodside Refinery in Halifax where he remained until about two years ago when his health failed. Deceased is survived by one sister, Miss Caroline Moncton, and two brothers, Dykes, of the Canadian National Railway, St. John, and Howard A. Lynn, Mass.
