

TWINS KEEP MOTHER FROM HANGING SOON

Cabinet Council Decides Quebec Murderess Shall Not Die on the Scaffold.

BALES' LIVES WOULD BE RISKED

Nothing Else Was Sufficient Reason for Commuting the Death Sentence.

Ottawa, Sept. 29.—Madame Gagnon, sentenced to die at Quebec on Friday morning will have a life imprisonment in the penitentiary. After further consideration of her case at a special meeting the cabinet council tonight decided to commute the death sentence. The action of the government was based entirely on the fact that Madame Gagnon is nursing the twins to which she gave birth in prison rather than two months ago.

ALLIES SEND POLES LARGE WAR SUPPLIES

England Sends 7 Ships With Stores and 12 With Food and America Sends 6.

London, Sept. 29.—A wireless dispatch from Moscow today says that Poland has received large supplies from the Allies through Danzig. England, the message declares, sent seven steamers loaded with munitions and three tanks, and twelve small vessels with provisions, while the United States sent six ships with war material. From France two ships arrived with more than one thousand infantrymen and 15 tanks, the message says.

FEARFUL FATE OF CANADA IF LEFT TO TORIES!

Ernest Lapointe Tells Vancouver Audience "Meighan Leads to Bolshevism."

Vancouver, Sept. 29.—Ernest Lapointe, M.P., declared that the prime minister is trying to mystify the people of Canada by acting a Bolshevik melodrama to cover the utter incompetence and reactionary tendencies of his government. He declared all his opponents as party wreckers. This is true, he said, and he would restore to the old game in its mischievous, selfishness, profiteering, monopolies, cronyism and privilege seekers, which always tend to associate reform and progress with revolution and crime.

ONE BIG UNION TRIES TO MAKE ROW AT DRUMHELLER

Calgary, Sept. 29.—The One Big Union has an agent at Drumheller, who has sent an unsigned telegram to the employees that they abolish the check-off. Just how much weight can be attached to the demand will not be known until Friday. The United Mine Workers are making a demand for a 27 per cent increase in wages. This is a different matter, and it may be taken for granted that if this demand is granted they will not worry about the check-off. Out of 6,000 miners in the district 4,000 are U. M. W.

CAPTURE STAFFS OF TWO SOVIET UNITS

Warsaw, Sept. 29.—The official statement on fighting operations, issued just before last midnight, says that in the North the Polish troops have reached the Shobora River. "In the region of Grodno the enemy is retreating," the statement adds. "Our detachments advancing in the direction of Pinsk have occupied Osmink, Drohicyn and Ivanovo, where they captured the staffs of the two Soviet divisions of infantry, six machine guns, a locomotive and 150 cars."

"DRY" CAMPAIGN FOR THE WELSH

This will extend the prohibition movement to the three countries in the British Isles. The campaign in Scotland, which followed that in England, has been underway several weeks.

MORE RIOTS AND PILLAGE IN LISBURN

Police Patrol Ambushed and a Sergeant is Seriously Injured in Melee.

REPRISALS FEARED BY THE CIVILIANS

Belfast Riots Began When Nationalists Fired Down Street Into Orange District.

Dublin, Sept. 29.—Rioting was renewed today in Lisburn, six miles from Belfast. Several houses and a shop were wrecked. The police charged, dispersing a mob.

A patrol of police was ambushed at Drimoleague near Skibbereen and a sergeant precariously wounded. Reprisals are feared.

MONCTON LABOR PICKS T. C. AYER FOR THE ELECTION

P. D. Ayer to Replace H. H. Stuart on the Farmers' Ticket.

Moncton, N. B., Sept. 29.—At a meeting of the Independent Labor Party, tonight, to select a candidate for the city of Moncton, ex-Councillor T. C. Ayer was chosen, but as Mr. Ayer is not at present in the city, it is not known whether he will accept. In case he declines to run, another meeting will be held.

TWEEDDALE HAS RUNNING MATE

Took Long Search Before Minister Could Find One Willing to go to the Debacle

Grand Falls, N. B., Sept. 29.—Minister Tweeddale has been successful in his search for a running mate and has one who is willing to be led as a lamb to the slaughter. John R. McCloskey, a young business man of this town, unknown outside the limits, will be the second man on the Liberal ticket.

PREMIER DRURY DENIES LABOR MEN ARE BOLSHEVISTS

Oshawa, Ont., Sept. 29.—Premier E. D. Drury, addressing a gathering here tonight under the joint auspices of the U. F. O. of South Ontario and labor men of Oshawa, hit back at Premier Arthur Meighan, of the Dominion, for having, as Mr. Drury said, caused farmers and labor men with Bolshevists. Premier Drury said: "I resent that. Can you call our record in the province Bolshevist? He added: Only thing the government had overturned was the worse system of forest planting in the North American continent."

SEEK TO DELAY HANGING OF TWO AT BORDEAUX JAIL

Montreal, Sept. 29.—A motion for a stay of execution was entered yesterday by Bos. Cohen, before the Court of Appeals, in the case of William Boycal and Peter Belan, sentenced to be hanged on October 12. The motion was taken on deliberation by the Court, Boycal and Belan, two foreigners, are accused of murdering a fellow countryman, in a rooming house in this city, during the early part of last year. Robbery was thought to be the motive.

DIED FROM RIOT WOUNDS

Belfast, Sept. 29.—Fred Blair, who was wounded during the rioting here last night, died today. The Lord Mayor has informed the promoters of the Irish atrocities commission that conditions in Belfast preclude his acceptance of the commission's invitation to go to Dublin and give testimony regarding the situation.

First White Born On Vancouver Island Is Dead In England

George R. Langford Was Born in Governor Blanchard's Home in 1851.

Victoria, B. C., Sept. 29.—Word has been received here of the death at Hethurst, Sussex, Eng., of George Richard Langford, the first white man born on Vancouver Island, that event occurring in 1851 at Governor Blanchard's house in this city. He left here in 1861, and only revisited British Columbia once, nine years ago.

MacSWINEY IS IN LESS PAIN, RESTS BETTER

General Condition is Little Changed But He is Obtaining Some Sleep.

Belfast, Sept. 29.—A coroner's jury, inquiring into the death of James MacSwiney, 73 years of age, who was shot dead at his home in Kilmogh, South Donegal, when the military went to arrest his son, who is now a prisoner in Belfast jail, today returned the following verdict: "He died from shock and hemorrhage caused by a revolver bullet which was fired by an officer of the British army accompanying a military patrol which was on duty at the time of the shooting. We find the officer and the military sergeant guilty of wilful murder, which is accentuated by their not attending the inquiry."

FIVE SINN FEINERS WILL BE SHOT FOR EVERY POLICEMAN

Warning Posted in Drogheda Declares Policy is "An Eye for An Eye."

Drogheda, Ireland, Sept. 29.—A shipyard worker, proceeding along the leading thoroughfare of the city, was shot and wounded today. His assailant, a crowd which collected, was dispersed by the military. A police patrol, at Drimoleague, near Skibbereen, was attacked last night. A sergeant of the patrol was seriously wounded.

THREAT TO STOP WORK DOES NOT SCARE FARMERS

Andover, N. B., Sept. 29.—Those who are working the county in the political interests of the Minister of Agriculture (the Hon. Mr. Tweeddale), in their zeal for securing his nomination and re-election are working a new club to drive voters to the Tweeddale cause and government support.

FARM-LABOR COMBINATION AT CHATHAM

Labor Nominates Two Candidates and Farmers the Same But Four Unite.

MAY NOT CHOOSE THE LATE MEMBERS

Four Party Ticket May be in Running in Northumberland County Election.

B., Sept. 29.—Northumberland county has been getting into life for the provincial election; some very interesting developments are looked for, and the chances of any of the late members returning to Fredericton next session grows smaller daily. That there will be at least three full tickets in the field.

THE LABOR CHOICES

At a meeting of the Labor organization held last evening, John W. Vanderbeck, of Miramichi, and M. J. Martin, of Chatham, were chosen Labor candidates, and at a United Farmers' convention held this afternoon, Dumphy, of Blackville, were chosen standard-bearers for the farmers. Representatives of the Labor bodies also attended the latter meeting, and after endorsing the nominations, it was decided to combine forces and run the four nominees as a ticket.

Mr. Vanderbeck has been a councillor for many years and needs no introduction to politics; J. S. Martin is one of Chatham's most successful young business men and is president of the Independent Labor Association on the Miramichi. Messrs. Fowle and Dumphy are well known farmers, located at either ends of the county.

MAY NOT BE CHOSEN

The government convention will be held here tomorrow afternoon, and though the four late members, Churchill, Murray, Allan and Gault, are quite willing to again constitute the government ticket, it is doubtful whether they will be acceptable to a majority of the party delegates elected at the parish conventions. The names of several other aspirants strongly supported are mentioned.

This afternoon the Opposition convention will also be held here, and while the names of several prominent men have been mentioned as probable candidates, nothing definite has yet been announced.

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
