House Adjourned Friday

Hon. Mr. Fielding Outlines Much Legislation to be Dealt With in the Next Two Days—Canadian Northern Guarantee Bill Passed.

Ottawa, May 17.—Parliament will adjourn on the conclusion of Friday's sitting, probably to meet again on July 18. Hon. Mr. Fielding made this announcement following the passing of the Canadian Northern guarantee bill in the commons tonight.

He stated the members on both sides had agreed that the adjournment be made this week and it was the government's desire to request. The decision, however, meant hard and earnest work. There was still much important legislation to be passed. MECHANIC SETTLEMENT THREATENED BY FIRE

Flames Sweeping Down on Village—Only Change of Wind Can Save it, is the Report—Great District is Swept by Raging Fire and Situation is Serious—Many Fires are Raging Over Province and Valuable Timber is Being Destroyed.

Penobscot, May 17.—A forest fire which was observed early Sunday morning has swept over a tract of country about eight miles long from headwaters of the Mechanic Settlement, and unless a change of wind comes tomorrow there is nothing can save Mechanic Settlement from being swept by the flames.

This is a district which has been subjected to the ravages of fire, before, although never before, perhaps to such an extent. The land burned over is chiefly government timber land, but it includes also the property of a great many private owners. The fire was first observed Sunday morning and several men turned out promptly to help fight the flames. On Monday morning more men turned out, but there was a high west wind amounting almost to a gale, and in spite of all efforts, the flames swept towards Mechanic Settlement and away to the headwaters of the Kennebec river through the settlement of Goshen. Everything is terribly dry and the flames have hopped up grass and all kinds of brush and are burning with great force. The fire has been burning since Monday morning and it is feared that it will continue to burn for several days.

Many people have been out trying to head off the fire but the high wind of the last two days has made their work with out effect. Last night it had died down and this morning it was thought to be out. About noon, however, the wind sprang up again and the flames went roaring back towards Mechanic Settlement. The loss so far has been quite heavy, although it is impossible to give even an approximate estimate. If the change of wind comes and the settlement is swept the amount of damage will be immense in timber alone.

Friday, May 18.

Owing to the long continued drought in May the ground all through the province was very dry. As a result of this, forest fires are raging and unless rain comes speedily the situation will be desperate. The foregoing despatch from Kingsport, N. HOUSES AT MCKIEL'S LAKE ARE DESTROYED

Several Boats, Also, Burned in Forest Fire—Captain Henderson a Heavy Loser.

A forest fire which started on Monday night at McKiel's Lake, about three or four miles from the Flats. The lake is the resort of the fishermen from the city who go up there every summer. It has been owned for the last fourteen years by Captain Henderson, who had a house and a club house on the lake, besides a handsome and commodious club house and an ice house.

About three years ago the lake was all burned over but at that time, after strenuous work, it was saved. On Monday, about 11 o'clock, the flames swept down upon it and in a short time the whole of the settlement was completely destroyed. The house he lived in himself, as well as the club house, was burned, as was the ice house.

The club house was a very commodious one. It was of two stories, with a verandah all round, and fine sleeping accommodation for parties. Two or three years ago some insurance was put on the place, but Captain Henderson is yet unable to say whether it had run out or not. There is a rumor to the effect that the fire was started by fishermen from this city boiling their kettle in the woods and neglecting to put the fire out.

Likely to Cost \$60,000 Per Mile.
