ECONOMIC PROGRAMS

Question No. 4,242-Mr. Roy (Laval):

Under the various economic programs implemented in order to stimulate employment over the past five years (a) what was the annual breakdown, by province, of the various government contributions (b) what percentage of the total budget did the contributions represent (c) what was (i) the approximate number of person-years required for the administration and the related budget (ii) the total cost of the programs?

Hon. Pierre Bussières (Minister of State (Finance)): The government has implemented a wide range of programs over the past five years that have sought to stimulate employment either directly or indirectly. In some of these programs employment creation has been the primary motivating factor as, for example, in the case of the employment tax credit introduced in October, 1977. In many other programs employment stimulus has been but one of a number of complementary objectives as, for example, with the Canadian Rental Supply Plan introduced with the November, 1981 budget where an equally important purpose was to increase the available supply of rental accommodation. Indeed, virtually all of the government's economic programs and many of its non-economic programs provide a major stimulus to employment.

In view of the complex nature of the various federal economic programs influencing employment, and in view of the varying degrees to which these programs are specifically focussed on job creation, it would not be possible to provide the detailed breakdowns and aggregations requested.

Mr. Norman Kelly (Parliamentary Secretary to President of the Treasury Board): The table hereunder shows the distribution of all certified bilingual employees occupying bilingual positions by language proficiency level attained in each ability. The "Others" column is comprised of abilities not required in the language profile of the position or the profile of the position has been established as a "P" which denotes a technical or professional level that is not measured by the language knowledge examination (LKE).
