SOX UNFURLED THEIR CUDGELS

GILBERT AND SHARP WERE BOTH HIT HARD IN SLUGGING BEE

The Beavers spotted Benny Gilbert five runs yesterday, but the elongated fellow's mind was probably wandering to the big league when the Sox unfurled their cudgels and smited him for four runs in the third inning. They didn't stop there, but kept up their bombardment during the next frame when Beatty pulled him out in favor of Ernie Sharp, but Knott's pets had their batting clothes on and continued the assault during which period he was touched up for six hits and five runs. Sharpe retired before the third out was registered and Chaput went into the mound when the offensive came to an end. There was no further hitting nor scoring for the Red Sox.

The Beavers played their second consecutive errorless contest and while they hit the ball hard yesterday, the Kitchener beavers were off color and unable to hold the opposing batsmen. This evening's game closes the series with Brantford and with either Rose or Chaput on the slab, it is expected that at least one of the games will be chalked up in Kitchener's favor.

Evans and Sawyer Won

DEFEATED WHITE AND KIRKLEY OVER THE TORONTO GOLF CLUB COURSE TO-DAY
Toronto June 24—"Chick" Evans and his partner, "Ned" Sawyer, evened up the count in their patriotic tour matches with Oswald Kirby and Gardiner White this morning over the course of the Toronto Golf Club. At Hamilton yesterday Evans lowered the amateur record from the Hamilton course, but, with his partner lost the match. This morning's match was the second of the tour. Evans and his partner won by two up and one to go. Those who were present at Hamilton and again at Toronto this morning all agreed that the calibre of golf shown here was not as good as that displayed in the Ambitious City. As was the case yesterday, Evans had low score of 73 to-day one above par. His partner, "Ned" Sawyer, the former United States champion turned in a card of 75 while Kirby's total was 77, and that of White 80. Evans did not start very good, no doubt because of his late arrival. The match was one hour late in starting owing to this delay, and Evans had to make a hurried jump from Guelph where he was visiting last night. The putting was not quite up to the standard expected, though there were several that earned applause, particularly that of Sawyer's on the tenth green. With the exception of Evans none of the players had ever played over the green before. There was a large gallery of spectators, who followed the players. Late this afternoon the visitors played over the Rosedale course.

FORMER CROWN ESCAPED F

AND MADE HIS WAY INTO GERMANY

PARIS, June 26.—Frederick William Hohenzollern, former German Crown Prince, has escaped from Holland and made his way into Germany.
Hints have come from Germany within the past few days that the military caste there would not be averse to bringing about a military situation within the former empire that would embroil the Allies in putting the peace treaty into effect. It seems improbable that the move made by the former Crown Prince, is connected with some such plan.

The former Crown Prince made his way into Holland shortly after the signing of the armistice last November and was interned there by the Dutch government, taking up his residence on the island of Wieringen, in Zuyder Zee.

ONTARIO RAILWAY AND MUNICIPAL B'D TAKES OVER RY.

WILL OPERATE CARS THIS AFTERNOON

TORONTO, June 26.—The Ontario Railway and Municipal Board this morning made an order taking over the Toronto Street Railway Co. and promised to commence the operation of cars, presumably with the employees now on strike, for the rush hours this afternoon.

A conference is being held between representatives of the men and civic and provincial authorities this afternoon, to determine the basis on which the men will return to work.
R. C. Harris, Toronto's commissioner of works, has been named by the Board as temporary manager of the company.

CONFERENCE WAS HELD THIS AFTERNOON

(Special to The Record)

TORONTO, June 26.—The Ontario Railway and Municipal Board has taken over the Toronto street railway and will endeavor to have the cars in operation by the rush hours tonight. Announcement to this effect was made by D. McIntyre, chairman of the Board at noon to-day.
The Board reached its decision this morning and the order for the taking over the line was issued after conference with general Manager Fleming of the railway company, at which the latter admitted the company's inability to operate.

Works Commissioner R. C. Harris has been appointed general manager of the line, under the direction of the Railway Board. The other officials of the company will likely remain.

The railway board has arranged for a conference with the strikers in the company's office at two-thirty this afternoon at which an effort will be made to arrive at an agreement under which the men will return to work.

"We will do our best to effect a fair settlement," said Mr. McIntyre and he appeared hopeful of doing so.

"If the Board grants the men an increase the additional cost will come out of the revenue of the company as though the increase were granted direct by the company.
