# CANADA COUNCIL—GRANT APPLICATIONS FROM SASKATCHEWAN

#### Question No. 1,654-Mr. Southam:

Under the Canada Council Act of 1957 (a) how many applications for grants were received from the province of Saskatchewan in 1963 for the arts, humanities and social sciences (b) how many were accepted and how many rejected (c) what was the total value of grants made in 1963 (d) what are the comparable statistics for Saskatchewan for 1964, to date (e) what was the total amount of grants made by the Canada Council to each of the other nine provinces in the year 1963 and in 1964, to date?

Hon. Maurice Lamontagne (Secretary of State): Because of section 13 of the Canada Council Act, the council is not an agent of Her Majesty; consequently, the government does not have records showing the statistics requested in this question, and the government has no power to direct the council to supply this information. The legal relationship was explained by the Right Hon. J. G. Diefenbaker on November 27, 1957 (Hansard, pp. 1558-9) and on June 18, 1958 (Hansard, p. 1389).
