ago to accept a free site in the Queen's Park offered to Trinity College by the University of Toronto for new buildings. This decision was reached, partly because the present buildings are inadequate to our rapidly growing needs, but still more because it was considered that the academic work of Trinity College and of the whole University would be greatly strengthened by having all the buildings in one locality, instead of having Trinity College separated by two miles, as it now is, from the other buildings in which a large part of our work is carried on. The plans for our new buildings are now in course of preparation.

With renewed thanks to our many friends whose generosity has made possible so encouraging a report, I commend this great educational work to their continued interest and support. Education and religion are probably the greatest needs of our growing Dominion, and in Trinity College these two great factors for the making of a nation go hand in hand.
