Max.—The cultivation of flax in Canada is becoming very general. The breadth sown is increasing every year. The excessive rains of the summer of 1866 damaged flax in many places; but, after all, we believe its cultivation is profitable. The average produce to the acre of the flax plant in seed is about ten bushels of 56 lbs. The price \$1.50 per bushel will net \$15, which is about the average value of the wheat crop per acre. Then there is the fibre which yields about 300 lbs. when clean, scutched, and ready for market. At \$10 per 100 lbs., this would give \$30 per acre—a net profit of itself over wheat; consequently, on 10,000 acres, there would be the great difference of \$300,000. If the profit were only half that amount, it would be a sufficient reason why attention should be given to the culture of flax.
