STATE INSURANCE WRONG AND REGULATION NOT WANTED

Fire Prevention Only Effort to Reduce Losses and Costs to Any Extent—Fire Insurance Reform Through Expense Account.

Chicago, January 15.—Arthur Hawhurst, insurance manager for Marshall Field & Co., delivered the first lecture of the year before the Fire Insurance Club of Chicago, in the Auditorium of the Insurance Exchange. His subject was "Insurance and Credits."

Having defined and discussed these topics, he devoted the greater part of his paper, however, to a consideration of the recent attack upon fire insurance made by insurance Superintendent Potts, of Illinois, and to an answer to his charges against the insurance companies and his arguments in favor of State Insurance.

Mr. Hawhurst declared that fire prevention was the only effort that would reduce the losses and the insurance cost to any extent, and that if the economist wished to accomplish anything they should start on this fact as a beginning.

As regards State regulation of rates, he admitted that under the Supreme Court decision the State could make rates, but the State could not compel the companies to write insurance at State made rates.

BIRMINGHAM'S FIRE LOSS BROUGHT INVESTIGATION

Fire Department Insufficiently Equipped Has Done Good Work—Alarm System Inadequate—Shingle Roofs Cause of Most Fires.

The prevailing unsatisfactory conditions, from a fire protection point of view, at present at Birmingham, Ala., have been made the subject of a special investigation by the engineers of the South Eastern Fire Insurance Association.

The chief criticism of the fire department, according to the engineers, lies in the fact that it is insufficiently financed and poorly equipped. Central supervision of the department and systematic operation is lacking; details being left largely to the discretion of company captains, the result being that the department seems a collection of separate organizations loosely bound together.

In spite of inadequate facilities, the department has done good work toward reduction of fire loss in Birmingham. Its failure to accomplish its part of the work is largely attributable to failure to provide them with adequate facilities.

The fire alarm system of Birmingham comes in for severe criticism by the engineers. They classify the present system as inadequate and in need of immediate attention. Shingle roofs and sparks on them appear to account for most of the fires. This is substantiated by the records, but whether this cause is also responsible for most of the fire loss is another question.

The building is a one-story wooden structure and before the firemen arrived upon the scene, under District Chief Hooper, the blaze had gained considerable headway. TAKING RISKS TO \$750,000 ON U.S. COTTON SHIPMENTS

Situation is Rapidly Improving, Says Report and Market is Developing Under the Demand.—Rates Not Excessive.

Washington, D.C., January 15.—The U. S. War Risk Board is writing up to \$750,000 on cargoes of cotton to Germany, the amount divided between vessels and cargoes, according to Secretary McAdoo. He quotes the board as reporting:

"It can be safely assumed that the American and German companies are doing their utmost to relieve the existing situation and to develop a sufficient market to take care of the largest cargo. The German companies have a very special reason for desiring to do their utmost in this direction.

"As far as marine insurance is concerned, we must differentiate between ships destined to German ports and those to neutral ports with the possibility of trans-shipment to Germany. As to the latter, the situation is practically no different than exists in ordinary years. Rates to Rotterdam, Copenhagen and other Scandinavian ports are practically the same as last year on similar vessels. The size of the market is more than sufficient to take care of the cargo by a suitable steamer.

"The situation as to shipments to Germany is more difficult, and the available market is limited to German and American companies. The situation is rapidly improving and the market is developing under the demand. Rates charged are not excessive, taking into account that the ports are on a coast on which it is safe to assume many of the risks to navigation have been removed, and that salvage operations near that coast under war conditions would be almost impossible.

The fire loss in Cincinnati for 1914 was \$68,000, with insurance loss of \$31,500. This is the smallest loss since 1884.
