The chasm between the mind of the highest anthropoids and the mind of man has been held to be not less than the chasm between their structures. This chasm Peter's mind practically bridges.

"I should hesitate to report the facts my individual testimony were the only evidence. The nature faker is one who accounts for animal behaviour in terms of human thought and feeling. From being classed among the nature fakers, I shall be saved by the fortunate circumstances that most of the tests which I shall report were made in the presence of a group of over 100 persons, many of them scientifically interested in the study of animal intelligence, and fully capable of making an independent interpretation of the facts.'s


