Mr. Robins related some interesting experiences and announced that he had raised the sum of \$1940, this being the proceeds of lectures, donations, etc. Since his return to Greenwood the debenture debt of between \$600 and \$700 on the parish hall had been paid off, \$200 had been contributed to the general funds of the diocese of Kootenay, and \$100 had been donated to the Phoenix church, which Mr. Robins had started as a mission two or three years ago and where good work is now being ne under some difficulties by Rev. E. P. Flewelling. St. Jude's church is free from debt, both on account of current expenditure and purchase of land and erection of the parish hall. It now has \$1000 in hand as a nucleus of a fund for building a suitable church later, and some \$240 on the general account. The recent sale and entertainment resulted in a balance of \$310 to credit of the orkers. Altogether an unusually satisfactory financial position, as regards finances of the church, was shown.
