MUNICIPAL ACT
MAKES CHANGESTownship Subdivision Prop-
erties are Affected by the
New Act.

To-morrow the new Municipal Act
comes into force, and one of the pro-
visions in the Act says: "No munici-
pal council or owner of land shall
lay out any highway less than 60
feet in width or except in the case
of a city or town, more than 100
feet in width."

There are a number of proposed
subdivisions that do not come up to
the requirements of the Act, that the
Township Council had not passed by-
laws for. The Township Council had
a special meeting this morning at the
Court House to consider the plans of
the sub-divisions, and to pass by-
laws to open them up. The Council
are meeting again to-night for the
same purpose. Among the proposed
sub-divisions are the Brantford
Heights, lying south of the Mount
Pleasant Road, the Bennett farm on
the Brantford and Paris toll road. A
further division of the Mohawk
Land Co's land, a property owned by
Mr. John W. Foster near Echo Place,
and south of the Brantford and Ham-
ilton radial property, owned by Mr.
J. Eddy, adjoining Mt. Hope cem-
tery, and also a property owned by
Mr. Murray of Paris, adjoining Rus-
sell street.

Laid at Rest

Very Impressive Funeral
of the Late M. H.
Robertson Today

The remains of Milton H. Robert-
son were laid to rest this afternoon
in the quaint old cemetery at Far-
ringdon church, amid bowed heads
and general heartfelt sympathy for
the bereaved family of a large con-
course of sincere and devout Chris-
tian friends of the deceased. The fun-
eral took place from the family resi-
dence, 64 Lorne Crescent, Rev. Mr.
Rose, pastor of Park Baptist church,
who had known the late Milton Rob-
ertson truly and well, conducted the
services and paid a loving tribute of
respect to the dead. The silent testi-
mony of a wealth of beautiful floral
tributes added to the impressive na-
ture of the obsequies. Services were
held at the house and grave and were
of a most impressive nature.

The pall-bearers were Messrs J. J. Rob-
ertson, P. D. Robertson, brothers of
the deceased, Kalamazoo, Mich.,
Prof. Alfred Hayes, Ithaca, N.Y.,
Prof. K. Duncan, University of
Pennsylvania, Pittsburg, Mr. Frank
M. Foster, Mr. A. G. Oliver, city.

The obsequies were attended by
leading Brantford citizens of all
walks of life and prominent business
men. Many admiring friends who had
learned to love the late Mr. Robert-
son in church and social life, joined
in the tribute of respect to the de-
parted one.

The eulogy of Rev. Mr. Rose was
particularly impressive, his address
being as follows:

"In the permissive and inscrutable
yet wise providence of God, another
family circle is broken here, and an-
other soul has found the House not
made with hands. Jesus said long
years ago that He would give the
crown of life to those who were faith-
ful unto death. The one who has left
us could say on the day of his depar-
ture as did Paul: 'I have fought the
good fight. I have finished my course.
I have kept the faith: henceforth there
is laid up for me the crown of right-
eousness, which the Lord the right-
eous judge shall give me at that day;
and not only to me, but also to all
them that love his appearing.'"

"To-day this tenanted body, the
precious abode of a noble soul, tells
us that the spirit has returned unto
God who gave it. For him truly the
stormy sea has been safely passed and
the harbor of peace entered; for him
the burden of sleepless nights and
frustrated hopes have no more hold or
place; for him there is now immortal
youth and the beatific vision of Christ
and fellowship with the saints. 'If
there is now a single note of sadness
in his song, it is because of the sorrow
of those who miss him here, or be-
cause there are those for whom he
longed who are yet unprepared for all
the bliss which awaits the death of
the children of God.'"

"His life was one of exceptional
constancy, sweetness and beauty. It
was like some rare flower that has to
be sought to be found, but that sweet-
ness and purities and makes glad all
those who come within the circle of
his influence. The fragrance of his
spirit, the atmosphere of his presence,
is here to-day, and will abide till we
meet him in the future with the
Master. In his going he has bequeath-
ed to all his loved ones and friends
the legacy of a precious and deathless
memory."

"If he could have planned this ser-
vice he would have instructed me to
speak a word to the living concerning
the importance of being ready for
such a day as this. He would have
chosen a text like this: 'Be ye also
ready, for in such an hour as ye think
not the Son of Man cometh.' (Matt.
24:44) His desire in this particular
will now endeavor to carry out in a
brief yet clear statement of the pre-
paration which is necessary."

"We are prepared for that day by
truly believing on the Lord Jesus
Christ; by most genuinely repenting
of our sins; by taking up the cross of
public confession of Christ; by the
full confession of Christ of our sins
and by separation from every wicked
thing and consecration to the work
assigned by Christ. 'If to-day you do
thus believe and thus repent and thus
confess Christ and thus turn away
from all that is contrary to the spirit
and teaching of Christ, I can most
confidently assure you of the author-
ity of His Word that you are ready
for both life and death. To-day if
you hear His voice harden not your
hearts.'"

"In concluding this brief and sim-
ple service, let me commend you all
to God; to His grace and unfailing
goodness, and urge you who are
'Risen with Christ to set your affec-
tions upon things which are above,
where Christ is seated upon the right
hand of God' for when Christ, who is
our life, shall be manifested, then
shall ye also be manifested with him
in glory."
