MINISTER OF JUSTICE DID EXACTLY RIGHT

In Ignoring Thaw's Writ of Habeas Corpus, So Says Court.

MONTREAL, Sept. 23 The court of appeals this morning decided that the Minister of Justice, Hon. Charles Doherty, was entitled to ignore the writ of habeas corpus secured by Messrs. N. K. Laflamme, K.C., and J. N. Greenshields for Thaw in an attempt to prevent his deportation from Canada after the Coaticook board of enquiry of the immigration authorities who decided to reject the Mattheawan fugitive. The court today said that the writ had been irregularly served and granted the application of the government authorities that it be quashed.

Rushing Work.
At the foot of Jubilee Terrace the work of building the retaining wall has been commenced in earnest. These are driven in by a huge steam pile driver operated from the mainland. Three rafts have been built for the workmen to stand on who are putting down the piles. NEW DEVICE TO REGULATE TRAFFIC

A semaphore device has been tried in Philadelphia for regulating traffic. The idea is pronounced a complete success. Instead of the noisy whistle in use heretofore the signal shows in the illumination of a traffic light. When the arm is extended over the roadway traffic must stop. The policeman stands at the base of the signalling device and by pulling a lever pulls or starts traffic. The word "stop" on the arm can be seen a block away. While working the lever the policeman, confident that the drivers can see it, can keep an eye on conditions about him.
