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LT. COL. J. CRAIG LOSES COMMAND

Major Kelly Evans in Temporary Charge of the 153rd.

Guelph, June 2.—A decided sensation was sprung here to-day when it became known that when the 153rd Wellington Battalion left early this morning for London, Lieut.-Col. J. J. Craig was no longer its commanding officer. It developed that late Monday night last he received a message from Col. L. A. Shannon, officer in command of the first division, relieving him of his command, and placing Major Kelly Evans, second in command, temporarily in command of the battalion with a probability of his being promoted to lieutenant-colonel of the regiment.

While the removal of Col. Craig, which was made on evidence to Major-General Sam Hughes, came as a surprise to the majority of citizens here, there were others in close touch with the situation who knew that action had been taken to cause his removal. Some time ago a number of serious charges against Col. Craig were made at division headquarters at London, and an officer was detailed to make a quiet investigation and he came to Guelph for two days and interviewed many people. Following his report to London a visit was paid to this city by Col. Shannon and Col. H. D. Smith, G.S.O., when several officers and civilians were closely questioned and their evidence taken. Before these officers went away from Guelph it is understood that Colonel Shannon asked Col. Craig for his resignation, but the latter absolutely refused to tender it and demanded a public investigation. Nothing more was heard about the matter until Col. Craig received word of his removal from his command. He accompanied the battalion to London this morning, but only because he wanted to see the officer commanding the division regarding the matter.

In a conversation over the telephone yesterday Col. Craig laid all the blame for his removal to the people of Guelph, whom he declared had not treated him fairly since he had been appointed, his claim being that the battalion, he denied absolutely that his conduct had been improper, or that he had acted in an insubordinate manner toward Colonel Shannon. He made it very clear that the matter was not closed and signified his intention of going to Ottawa to see Major-General Hughes.

Col. Craig has been an officer of the Canadian Militia for a great many years; prior to the war was in command of the 90th Wellington Rifles. He has a son at the front. He is also public school inspector for South Wellington, and some years ago represented the north riding of Wellington in the Ontario Legislature.

SENT HOME

Sergeant of French Infantry Discharged After Being Wounded 17 Times.

New York, June 2.—Charles Duvent, designated as official painter for the French army, accompanied by a number of artists who will assist at a bazaar to be held here soon for the benefit of the Entente Allies, arrived to-day on the French Line Steamship Chicago from Bordeaux.
Sergeant D. Valat, formerly attached to the 152nd regiment of French infantry serving on the western front, another passenger, said that he had been wounded seventeen times and sent home. He is going to Montreal.
