

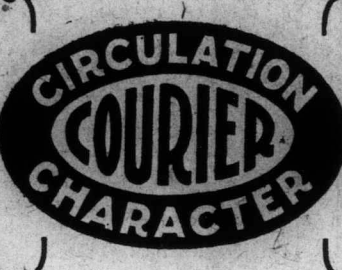

WAR CONFERENCE BEGINS NEXT WEEK

Regular Sessions to be Held by War Cabinet and Overseas Statesmen

London, March 13.—The Canadian Associated Press is authoritatively informed that the proceedings of the Imperial War Conference will begin next week. The meetings between the overseas statesmen already arrived and the members of the British War Cabinet have been in the way of preliminary or sectional conferences. The overseas statesmen will give the overseas statesmen an opportunity of ventilating any views they particularly wish to bring forward. At the conference beginning next week, Walter Long, the Colonial Secretary, will preside, when Premier Lloyd George is unable to do so. These gatherings are not of the same plane as the Imperial Conferences of times past, inasmuch as the overseas statesmen who have been specially invited to London will attend these gatherings. British statesmen holding portfolios will attend when subjects affecting their own departments are discussed. Finally there are meetings of the Imperial War Cabinet consisting of the five principal members of the British Government, together with the premiers only of the Dominion. These latter gatherings will deal with most intimate matters concerning the war. The Imperial War Conference, that is, the larger deliberative body, will decide for itself how much its proceedings shall be made public.

Germany Plans

Turks Evict VICTORY IS FORESEEN FOR ALLIES

Entente Powers on Eve of Decisive Development Says M. Raoul Peret

INCREASED TAXATION To Come in France in Order to Meet War Expenses A TREMENDOUS TOT Spent by France During Struggle

By Courier Leased Wire.
Paris, March 15.—At the end of the war, France will have spent 3,375,000,000 francs, according to a report made by Raoul Peret to a meeting of the budget committee of the chamber of deputies, in behalf of the committee, on the provisional created by the government for the second quarter of the year. The source of every nature realized during the same period are estimated M. Peret at 73,408,000,000 francs. M. Peret in his report proposed the budget committee, created taxation and certain reductions in expenditures. It would appear from the report of M. Peret that the amount of the short-term securities issued in circulation at the end of February was 14,500,000,000 francs.

In addition to her expenditure France has advanced to her ally 3,375,000,000 francs, making a total outlay since August 1, 1914, of 3,000,000,000 francs. The budget committee regrets that the government has not stimulated the production and that it waited long before restricting consumption. It demands that the government practice a policy more in conformity with the exigencies of the situation and that it take more care to serve the forces of resistance to an economical point of view.

"We should not show weakness," said M. Peret, "when we are on the eve of decisive victory. At the same time our must not be closed to the difficult which it will be necessary to come in order to win."

Subs Futile
Paris, France, March 15.—An official statement issued by the ministry last night says that during the week ending midnight March 13, the French navy sank seven hundred and seven merchant ships of all nationalities, above tons net and exclusive of fishing coasting vessels, entered ports, and the same period two French ships of over 1,500 tons gross sunk by submarines or mines.
