THE WORK OF FIENDS. A Diabolical Attempt to Wreck

a C.P.R, Train.

Express From Terente - A Narrew Escape.

Smith's Falls, Ont., April 4.—One of the most diabolical attempts at train wrecking in the history of this province was that which was made last night, but which fortunately did not result as seriously as it might have done.

When the C. P. R. express, which left Torento at 9 o'clock on Friday night, was but a few miles west of the town of Perth, the baggage, express and two passenger cars left the rails and were badly smashed. The ending and Pullman remained on the track. There were a large number of passengers on board, and all were badly shaken up. Those in the second class car, together with the express and postal agents, had a miraculous escape from instant death. Would Startle Thristians.

Cleveland, O., April 5.—F. H. Taylor, who has just arrived here after a residence of three years in Havana, says in regard to reports of Spanish cruelty:

"The worst has not been told. I have known of persons being strung up by the thumbs at Morro Castle and left for days at a time at the mercy of the vicious files, attracted in swarms by molasses smeared on the vicitus faces and chests for that purpose. Many other forms of torture are practised upon the rebels when taken.

"These outrages against humanity do occur, as any citizen of Havana can testify. In fact, if the persecuted wretches in the Cuban dungeons could testify, stories of fiendish torture could be told which would startle the Christian World."

Halifax, N.S., April 4.—It is understood General Montgomery Moore has recommended the establishment of a bettery of field artillery at Bedford, N.S. He states that it will be of great assistance to regulars, as it will be the only field battery in the province. Its expensive major mullane of the Royal Artillery, who holds a Victoria Cross for bravery, will be attached to the battery. He has signed his name to a petition which has been sent to Ottawa.
