the Paris Exposition Will be Policed.

The special police force required for the Paris Exhibition has at last been arranged for after no little friction between the authorities interested, says a London newspaper. The Paris Municipal Council looks askance at the police, partly because it does not control them, and partly because the sergots hustle on occasion the Socialist electors who are held in high honor at the Hotel de Ville. In consequence the Council stipulated before it would grant any money that the augmentation of the police force should not be permanent. To procure suitable men for only a short period was not easy, but M. Lepine, the Prefect of Police, has solyed the problem by dint of an in-genious combination, into the details of which it is unnecessary to enter. He will have, however, to manage with fewer men man he asked for, as the money granted him is only \$300,-000 instead of the \$600,000 he considered requisite. As it is, he will dispose of an additional force of 600 men in uniform and 60 extra plain-clothes detectives. He will also be allowed to draw on the Republican Guards to the extent of 300 sounted men and 500 foot soldiers. Order will thus be maintained in the Exhibition grounds by a special force plemented if necessary by the reserve brigades.

The chief fear of the authorities is that ugly crushes may result from the immense crowds that will congregate. This question is being minutely studied, and the most careful, arrangements are being made for regulating traffic, and for establishing police barracks at dangerous points. There will be five police-stations within the manibition grounds. The ambulance arrangements will also be

INSECT PESTS.

Entomological Society's Report The San Jose Scale

Effective Remedies for the Evil -Fumigat on and Spraying.

The annual report for 1899 of the Entomological Society of Ontario published by the Department of Agriculture is received. It possesses a special interest for farmers as it is of highly practical character and deals extensively with the San Jose scale and other destructive insects whose habits have been closely studied by scientists with the object of discovering the best means for preventing their ravages. During the meeting of the Entomological Society last fall a conference on the subject of the San Jose scale was held which was attended by several leading exa good many useful suggestions as to remedial processes, which are set forth in detail in the report among those who addressed the gathering on this topic were Dr. James Fletcher, Dominion Entomologist, Prof. of Wooster, Ohio, Prof. Wm Lochhead, of the Ontario Agricultural College and Inspector Fisher, of Free-Ont. It is gratifying to learn that the somewhat drastic measures adopted by the Provincial Government last year including the fumiga-tion of nursery stock, likely to be infested with the scale and the destruction of trees where necessary have proved effective. The pest which has been very widely prevalent in the States where it has resulted in great loss to fruit growers has been checked in Ontario and is prac-tically confined to the neighborhood of St. Catharines and Niagara and the Township of Harwick.

Prof. Lochhead also devoted some attention to the spruce gall louse which has injured the spruce trees considerably of late years and treated of other injurious insects more parti-cularly the codling worm and the tent caterpillar. Several of the mem-bers put on record these observations of the more noticeable entomological characteristics of the season in their respective localities among the writers being Dr. Fletcher, W. H. Har-rington, Ottawa: Arthur Gibson, Ottawa; J. A. Moffatt, London; Rev. C. J. S. Bethune, London, and Rev T. W. Fyles, Levis, Que. Dr. Fletcher's notes dealt principally with two forms of insect life which have proved very destructive to the pea crop-the pea weevil and the pea aphis. He pointed out that the loss was aggravated by neglect on the part of the farmers who to secure immunity from the attacks of the wee vil should either have their seed fumigated with bisulphide of carbon or hold it over for a year. The undue increase of the various kinds of plant lice seems to be particularly affected by meteorological conditions, and as in the past their is no record of serious injury to the pea crop by these insects there is every reason to hope that the Province will escape another

such visitation for some time.

A paper by Prof. Webster on the development of entomological science during the past century sets forth very clearly the strides that have been made in this important department of knowledge and the ad vantage which has thereby accrued to agriculture in the saving effected by the destruction of harmful insects.

The Report of the Inspector o Fumigation Appliances and the Superintendent of Experimental Spraying for 1899 are also published. The latter gives most convincing evidence as to the beneficial effects of orchard spraying upon the quality and quantity of fruit produce and the increasing interest taken by farmers in the subject. The attendance at spraying experiments has increased from 1,833 in the year 1896, to 3,-

The bee martin is quite another sort. His nest may have a foundation of mud, but it is cushioned within, stuccoed without, with fine wood lichens, into a thing of beauty. It vies, indeed, with the nests of the chimney swallow, the queer angular affairs stuck fast against a sooty chimney side. They are of tiny sticks, built up like elfin log cabins, and cemented at the corners, as well as held fast to the chimney by a sort of glue secreted by the birds them-

Mockingbirds love to nest in garden shrubbery, orchard tangle, or the scented thickets of an abandoned field. They build big nests, soft, elastic, and line with the finest hair. Indeed, they come next to the oriole as aerial architects. Almost every one has seen the pretty purse-shaped oriole houses. swung from orchard boughs, but few. leg. A certain domi nick pullet made up her mind to lay nowhere but on the joist of an outhouse, and kept that mind for two years, although every egg fell and was smashed as soon as it was laid. If the outhouse was closed, she would drop the egg on the ground outside, but if a crack or cranny was left open even for half an hour, she seemed to know it instinctively, and darted inside.

Whip-poor-wills nest on the ground, merely scratching out the least hollow for their freckled eggs. Ostriches build in the sand as shown in accom-panying picture. Wild turkeys make the same sort of a nest, but hide it in a brush pile, or beside a fallen tree. As soon as an egg is laid the hen covers it with leaves. In fact, she fills the whole nest until it is indistinguishaway from the nest and pretending to lay elsewhere, if they find themselves followed.

Guinea fowls make beautiful deep nests in summer earth, choosing an ambush of thick briers or weeds. But while the hen is laying, the cock, foolish fellow, stands upon a near eminence, and calls so loudly that it is easy to find his mate. Once she is easy to find his mate. Once sae is found, beware of putting your hand in the nest. If you touch it, the birds will instantly forsake it. But if you remove the eggs with a silver spoon, the half dozen hens who commonly nest together will keep on laying there
