A suggestion in the regard to the more systematic advertising of Canada in Great Britain was received a few days ago from a prominent business man of Glasgow, Scotland, who is at present in Canada on a combined trip of business and pleasure, says the Toronto Globe. He had attended the Glasgow Exhibition and had seen will cause more than a passing pang there the Canadian exhibit.
