

Judge Scores Martin's Counsel For His Sligating Remarks On Value of Intant Life, and Says That Neither in Morals Such a Monstrous Doctrine-A Reserve

Toronto, Nov. 12 .- Yesterday the Toronto, Nov. 12.—Yesterday the Martins were tried on the charge of murdering their seven-months-old child. The verdict returned by the jury after considering the evidence for two hours was:

Alexander Martin—Guilty.

Ethel Martin—Not guilty.

Chief Justice Falconbridge immediately discharged Mrs. Martin from

chief Justice Falconoridge immediately discharged Mrs. Martin from custody. On behalf of Martin, his counsel, Mr. Hassard, asked for a reserve case to the Court of Appeal for two reasons: whether the confession of Mrs. Martin should have been introduced, and whether the counsel for the defence should not have been per-mitted to address the jury after the

Crown prosecutor.

His Lordship said: "I think I shall His Lordship said: "I think I shall reserve the case, because there is a judgment of the court in favor of Mr. Hassard's proposition about the right of reply. Otherwise, on the first ground, I shall feel very little would be reported judgment in that direction, I shall reserve the case and direct the prisoner to be remanded for sentence until the judgment of the Court of Appeal has been propounced."

Subsequently His Lordship sent for counsel for the defence. Mr. Hassard had left the building, but Mr. Robinett was found. His Lordship said he was positive he was right in allowing the confession of Mrs. Martin to be introduced, and the defence could go to the higher court on the right te really only. to reply only.

The Judges Charge.

The charge of Chief Justice Fal-conbridge to the jury was thorough, intense and sympathetic. He reviewed the evidence from start to finish, to the evidence from start to finish, to the minutest detail. He pointed out that the evidence was mostly circum-stantial. There were few murder con-victions except on circumstantial evi-

dence.
"If you conclude," said the Chief Justice, "that the child came to its death at the hands of the man, there are no circumstances which will justify your reduction from murder to one of manslaughter. With regard to the woman, you may come to a different work of the woman, you may come to a different manslaughter. one of manslaughter. With regard to the woman, you may come to a dif-ferent decision. Here you have three courses open before you. If she did not aid or countenance the deed, she cannot be held guilty even though she was present and afterwards did not hand her husband over to justice. If she was in any way a party to the crime, she is guilty of murder. If she was under the influence of her husband, you may word your verdict manslaughter.

As Well As Bullets By Outpost Jap and Russian Soldiers.

Fights Occur Every Day-Artillery Duels Indulged In, But Neither Side Seems to Make Much Progress-No Confirmation of Rumor of the Capitula-

Mukden, Nov. 12.-The positions of the armies on both sides remain lit-tle changed, though there is contithe changed, though an unual skirmishing going on with the object of securing minor positions tending to strengthen the respective lines of defence. The Russian scouts are very daring in secretly reconnoitering the whole of the Japanese line, some even creeping up to the Japanese trenches and lying concealed there all day and returning at night. The Japanese have construct, night. The Japanese have construct, ed in many places double and even triple and quadruple lines of trenches, wire entanglements, mines and pits. A Cossack patrol en Nov. 10 penetrated as far as Sandiapu, where penetrated as lar as Sandiapu, waste they indicted a blow against a large force of Japanese and then returned rapidly to the Russian main line without loss. A patrol also got in the rear of two Japanese companies moving to attack a Russian position. The Cossacks defeated the Japanese and returned safely to the anese and returned safely to the Russian line.

An artillery fire from both sides is

continued at intervals. It is heavier continued at intervals. It is heavier on the Russian right wing, where all day on Nov. 9 and also during the night the Russians shelled the Jap-anese positions with their heavy guns. Neither side on that date gained any advantage.

Gained Great Advantage.

As a result of the heavy bombard-ment by the Russians the Japanese have withdrawn some of their batter have withdrawn some of their batteries from the advanced pesitions. It is believed that not being ready to attack, they are falling back to the hills. The Russians gained a great advantage when towards the end of the battle on the Shakhe River they recgpture Lone Tree Hill. This hill commands a large part of the plain over which the Japanese must

The operations are about the same each day. There is artillery firing most of the time and the frequent

clashes of infantry at night.

The soldiers of the opposing outposts in close proximity engage in the exchange of eigarettes and other

There was a heavy exchange of artillery fire Thursday at the Russian began shelling the Japanese trenches and the Japanese batteries respond-

During Thursday night Russian vol unteers dislodged a detachment of Japanese infantry from trenches in Japanese infastry from trenches in front of Lone Tree (Poutiloff) Hill.
The Japanese continue to show activity on the left flank, without however, engaging in any serieus movement.
Comfortable dugouts are being built along the Russian lines, and the soldiers seem to think that they will winter where they are. The idea that Field Marshal Oyama contemp-

that Field Marshal Oyama contempthat Field Marshal Oyama contemp-lates an attempt to take Mukden is not generally entertained. Both sides seem to be content for the present with a suspension of hostilities. Warm clothing is being distributed among the troops.

Threw Sixty Large Shells.

During the bombardment Thursday night the Russians threw 60 large melinite shells into the Japanese camp opposite Manalon Hill.

The Japanese, who during the previous cannonading seemed to have successfully used a searchlight directed against the Russian positions for the Burpose of covering their operations against the Russian positions for the purpose of covering their operations at night in the extension of their field works in the region of the rail-way, did not reply when the Russi-ans attacked them farther to the

east.
The Japanese are notably economical in the use of ammunition, as though anticipating an early battle, when great quantities will become

necessary.

It is known that the Japanese have placed guns of large calibre in the vicinity of the Shakhe railway station, bringing Schiatun, the next station to the north, within the range of their fire.
