## GREAT QUEBEC BRIDGE SOUTH SIDE COMPLETED.

SHORE WORK ON ST. LAWRENCE

Contractors Begin Superstructure of the Cantilever Extension and Expect to Have 400 Feet Completed By Fall-Largest and Most Important Bridge Structure Ever Undertaken in the Whole World.

All the shore work of the new Que-All the shore work of the new Quebec bridge on the south side of the River St. Lawrence at the Chaudiere, seven miles west of the city of Quebec, has just been completed, together with the railway line to connect the G. T. P. and I. C. R. from the Chaudiere curve to spproach the bridge.

The contractors will now commence the construction of the superstructure of the cantilever extension from the south side, and expect to finish at least four hundred feet of the same by the fall. In the meantime the false wood-

fall. In the meantime the false wood-work on the south shore is being taken down and removed to the north shore, where it will be erected, and later the talse steel work, so that the superstructural work will be commenced next spring and pushed to completion, with the prospect of the bridge being alto-gether completed by the fall of 1998. The Quebec bridge to span the St. Lawrence is without exception the

largest and most important structure of the kind ever undertaken in the



QUEBEC BRIDGE AT PRESENT. whole world, writes correspondent O'-Plaherty in The Globe. When it is open for traffic, long before the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway is built, the steel parts will weigh 33,000 tons, and many of

will weigh 33,000 tons, and many of the parts connected with it weigh 100 tons, which are hoisted and placed in position by the largest traveling crane worked by electricity in existence, which stands at its highest point 360 feet above the level of the river, and moves forward as it builds its own moves forward as it builds its own grand work.

The writer has no intention to enter into a full description of the new bridge, which is destined to play a very insportant part in the commercial future of the whole Dominion of Canada. It would take too much space to go into details. Consequently the description is only a superficial one in order to give readers an idea of the immensity of the work. The plans of

the bridge—which is to cost \$7,000,000, with its approaches, when completed—were commerced in 1897. were commeuced in 1897.

The proposition was a huge undertaking at the time to the emiment engineers called upon to study and formulate the problem, and the success with which they have considered. with which they have overcome all ob with which they have overcome an obstacles has been acknowledged by engineers from every part of the world who have from time to time inspected the mammoth work as it progressed, and pronounced it the greatest ingenuity of the age.

This wharf has been commenced. The flooring of the bridge over which the traffic will cross is 160 feet above the river level. In conjunction with the New Quebec bridge the construction of the new Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, eastern section, from La Tuque, on the St. Lawrence River, 150 miles west of Quebec, to the bridge, has been commenced in earnest at both ends, and at intersecting points. The principal contractors, Messrs. McDonald, Hogan & O'Brien, have lost no time in beginning the construction, and have all of the construction, and have already sub-let parts of the work. Mr. M. P. Men pay serious attention to such a statement from such a man, and they are induced to put a curb on themselves when Sir Frederick Treves tells them that alcohol is apt to lead to a physical bank-
