Editorial Notes.

What is the real process of war? You carefully select from the general population on both sides the healthiest, sturdiest, the physically and mentally soundest, those possessing precisely the virile and manly qualities which you desire to preserve...

There were 1,675 rural mail routes in operation in Canada on September 1, serving nearly 70,000 boxes. In addition 511 new routes were under advertisement so that there are nearly 2,400 routes either already established or about to be set up...

In addition, Hon. Mr. Pelletier since taking office has opened 1,390 new post offices, as well as 675 new money order offices, and 509 postal note offices. From October 1, 1911, to the present time the amount remitted by money orders shows an increase of \$38,850,000 as compared with the previous eighteen months, of 38 per cent.

Mr. Borden's Defence Ideas.

In his speech at Halifax, Mr. Borden simply reiterated his position on the Canadian naval attitude. There was nothing sensational or even sentimental about the commonplace facts which he set forth.

Canada is desirous of taking her place in the navy-making of the empire, and, feeling a responsibility in this respect, she also feels a desire to share a certain amount of responsibility in connection with the administration of the naval and defence department.

Until the overseas dominions share, both in the cost and the responsibility of making war, there can be no really close connection between Downing street and the governments of the several dominions on self defence questions.

Mr. Borden stands well for the Canadian idea, which is neither for aloofness nor dictatorialness. We simply desire to take our modest place in the imperial defence scheme, paying our share of the way, and having a voice in the expenditure.

Opera House.

It has been decided that 'The Academy Players' on their first appearance here this season (Monday, Oct. 13th) will present Henry Arthur Jones' great play 'The Hypocrites'.

More About Fenian Raid Veterans.

THE VAGUE, VERBOSE E. M. McDONALD AGAIN SQUELCHED BY C. E. TANNER, K. C., M. P. P.

(Continued from Page 1.)

The single point for consideration is this: Did the Monk resolution include Nova Scotian volunteers?

Will Mr. McDonald deny the fact that it did include them? He dare not deny it. The words of the resolution are too clear for that. Here is the resolution:—

'That it is desirable that the Government of Canada should recognize in some substantial manner the services rendered during the Fenian Raids in 1866 and 1870, by our Canadian volunteers.'

It being absolutely clear that the Monk resolution included Nova Scotians, where does Mr. McDonald stand? He voted against the resolution. He admits that.

As a defence he says that Nova Scotians had to be considered and that Sir Fred Borden wanted time to consider them. So, in order to 'consider' Nova Scotians the Government and its Liberal supporters, including Mr. McDonald, stood up like little men and voted solidly against the resolution that would have pledged Parliament to give Nova Scotians, as well as other Canadian volunteers, a Bounty. A nice way, indeed, to 'consider' Nova Scotia volunteers.

In regard to the Middleboro resolution of 1911 it is particularly amusing to be told by Mr. McDonald that the Conservatives were not 'sincere' in pressing it. Was he sincere in voting against it?

Bear in mind that a year before this, in 1910 as I have already shown the Laurier Government had formally and positively declared against a Bounty.

In 1911, when Mr. Middleboro moved, the Liberals, every man of them, stuck to their policy of no Bounty.

The Conservatives, on the other hand, voted for a Bounty; and a year later, in 1912, when they had the power to grant a Bounty, proved their sincerity by passing a Bounty Law.

I regret very much that that kind of sincerity does not satisfy Mr. McDonald.

I presume that the 'sincerity' he prefers is the kind that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir Fred Borden practised on the volunteers from 1866 until 1910.

A word before I close in regard to the Hansard references. Mr. McDonald knows that Hansard is issued from day to day in pamphlet form. Later on the bound volumes are issued to members of Parliament and libraries.

I have the official daily Hansard; and my references, with one slight exception which I will mention, are absolutely correct; and Mr. McDonald knows they are correct. His remarks on this point make very cheap and childish evasion. The exception I refer to is this, I did not remember that there was a member named Low in the House, and treated that name as a typographical error for Law.

As to Mr. McDonald's excuse that he was at home and that Mr. Sinclair was in England when the vote on the Middleboro resolution was taken, it makes no difference. If they were both in China at the time they cannot repudiate their responsibility.

They are both recorded in regular course as voting against a Bounty. They are so recorded with their own knowledge and consent as members of Parliament. The same thing is done every time a vote is taken. It is unprecedented for a member of Parliament to repudiate his vote on a pair unless he takes the matter up in the House and gives his reasons. No member of Parliament who appreciates his responsibility as such, would descend to the trick of being recorded on a pair, and then if an emergency should arise outside of Parliament, repudiate his vote and his responsibility. Mr. McDonald and Mr. Sinclair having allowed the record to go unchallenged, are bound in honor by parliamentary practice to abide by the record. Any other course would be entirely subversive of parliamentary responsibility.

As to Mr. McDonald's worry about delay in payment it is certainly laughable to think of a man who, from 1904 until 1911, opposed a Bounty and who blindly supported a government that in 1910 declared that no Bounties would be paid, now clamouring because the Borden Government had not disposed of the whole matter within two years.

But that is not a piece with the loud mouthed and disgruntled men like Mr. McDonald are making on many questions. Having allowed grievances to accumulate during fifteen years of Liberal Government, these gentlemen who sat dumb before Laurier, evidently expect Borden to put everything right in the twinkling of an eye. They had our loads of patience with Laurier, but now, like Cox, they cannot wait.

What galls them most is the sad truth, to them, which is surely possessing their souls, that Borden will keep them waiting a very long time before he will let them back to the seats of the mighty.

An effort has been made to fence and improve the old Wolfville cemetery. In March last a committee of two, Dr. G. E. DeWitt and Mr. C. R. H. Starr, was appointed to take the necessary steps to solicit subscriptions to the fund. In the month of April a circular was printed by THE ACADIAN and mailed to those interested in the project. The only response from the circular was from two gentlemen in the town who deposited with the Town Clerk the sum of \$20.00. The sum of \$30.00 was asked for in the circular for the fencing and upkeep of the cemetery. Scout Master Higgins was requested to utilize the Boy Scouts to solicit subscriptions for the purpose at that period. The time of the Scouts was limited as it was just before the opening of the public schools. During the few days at their disposal they collected \$30.00 in cash and additional promises of \$13.00 making together with the \$20.00 previously in fund the amount of \$73.00.

The Boy Scouts were promised a commission for their work and they generously contributed to the fund so subscribed \$72.00 now in the hands of the Town Clerk in fact. All interested in the old cemetery were sure will acknowledge that there is a pressing need to subscribe to the fund of this worthy object. The cemetery at present is a resort for common loafers a disgrace to the locality and the committee would respectfully ask all interested to contribute to the work now commenced of fencing and caring for the cemetery that it may be successfully accomplished.
